

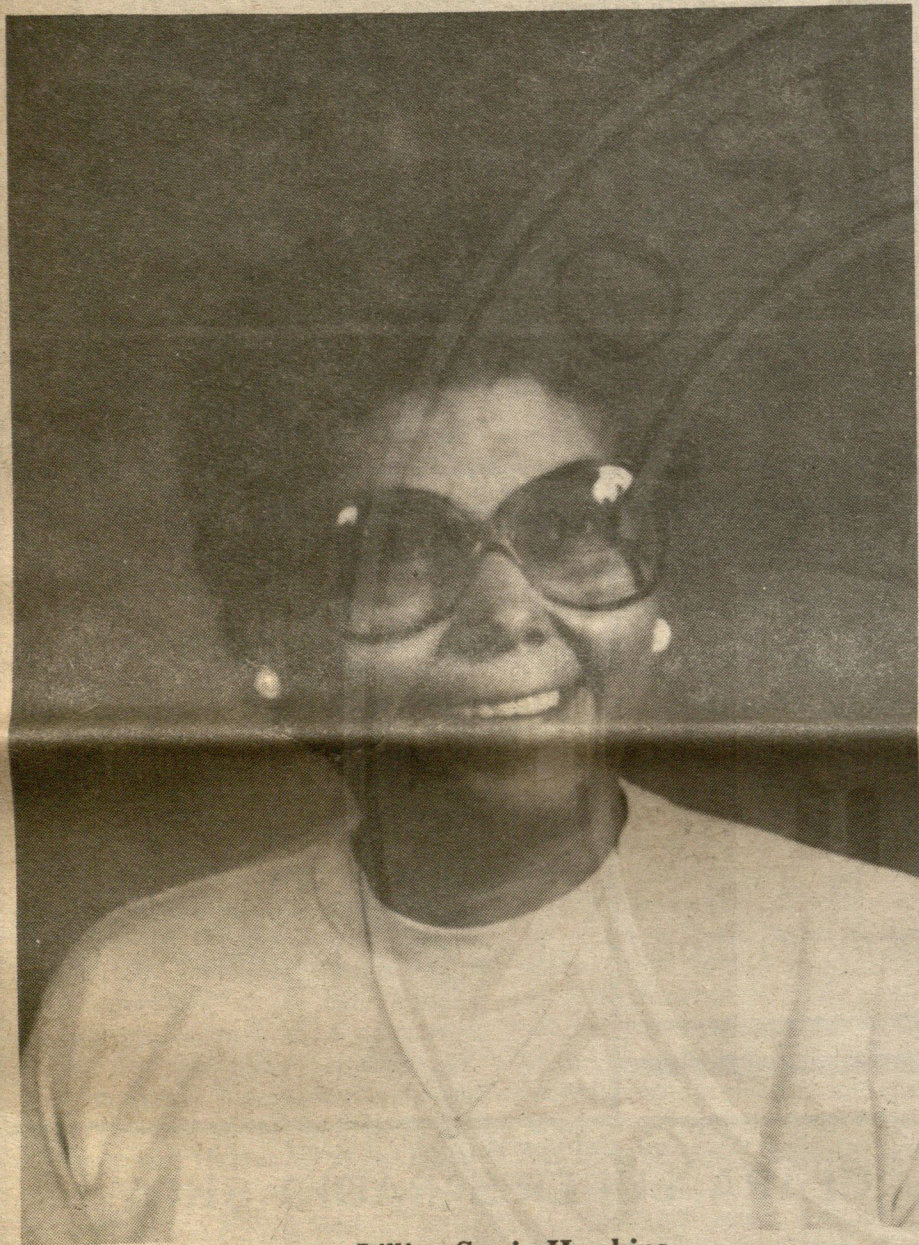

# Teacher Frances Swain Hawkins Succumbs

Longtime Oklahoma City Public School teacher, beloved mother and sister Frances Lillian Swain Hawkins died Tuesday following a one car accident in the 600 block of N.E. 63rd.

The funeral services, being conducted by the Rolfe Funeral Home, will be Saturday, November 14, 11:00 a.m. at the Saint Christopher's Episcopal Church, 800 N. Midwest Blvd., Midwest City, Oklahoma. The local alumnae chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. will hold their special "Ivy Beyond The Wall" service tonight, Friday, November 13, at 7:00 p.m. at Rolfe Funeral Home, 1801 Robert H. Rolfe Street, Oklahoma City. The body will lie in state at the funeral home until 10:00 a.m. Saturday.

Forty-three year old Hawkins, is the second of two children born to Frank Leslie Swain Sr. and Mildred Gilliam Swain. Both parents preceded her in death.

She was a product of the Oklahoma City Public Schools receiving her high school diploma in 1963 from Douglass High School. She received her Bachelors Degree from Langston University in 1967.

Following her service as a social worker in Los Angeles, Calif., she was employed as a teacher in the Oklahoma City Public Schools. She taught at Capitol Hill Middle School and Jackson Middle School where she served until her death.

She was married to Eddie Hawkins Jr. of Oklahoma City. To this union twin children were born. Survivors include her twins,

daughter Pamela Mildred Hawkins and son Phillip Earl Hawkins, of the home; a brother, Frank Leslie Swain Jr. of Chicago, Ill.; a niece, Christina Frances Swain, of the home; a host of aunts, uncles, cousins, other relatives and friends. Family members say Hawkins was

a caring and devoted mother and teacher. Her fellow teachers say she extended the same type of love to all her pupils.

The family expresses thanks and appreciation for all kindnesses extended during this time of bereavement.

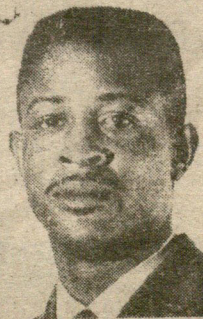
Hundreds of Oklahomans gathered at the Historical Society's lawn to hear prayers for Oklahoma's war dead this week as part of Veteran's Day activities.

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## Human Rights Director Post Open

The Oklahoma Human Rights Commission is accepting applications for the position of Director. The Oklahoma Human Rights Commission is a state agency statutorily mandated to "work toward removing friction, eliminating discrimination and promoting unity among all the people of Oklahoma". The Oklahoma Human Rights Commission enforces the state Anti-Discrimination Act, 25 Okla. Stat. Ann. S1101 et. seq., which prohibits employment, housing, and public accommodation discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or handicap. Pursuant to 74 Okla. Stat. Ann. S952, the agency's nine-member Commission is appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Commission in turn appoints the Director as provided by 74 Okla. Stat. Ann. S953(a). The Director manages and administers all of the agency's operations and reports to the Commission, which establishes policy, sets goals and approves programs and projects related to eliminating discrimination and improving intergroup relations within the

State of Oklahoma.

The successful candidate will be an intelligent, hard-working leader with strong management and communication skills, experienced working with budgetary matters, and have a thorough understanding of state and federal civil rights laws, rules, regulations and administration procedures.

The National Urban League inaugurated Equal Opportunity Day November 19, 1956. It was timed to coincide with the 93rd anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. The day was to focus attention throughout the United States on positive efforts to ensure fair and equal treatment of all citizens regardless of race, color, religion or national origin.

The purpose of EOD is to urge all Americans to rededicate themselves to the affirmation of their belief that "all men are created equal," and to pledge their allegiance to the fulfillment of the American Democratic ideal.

## Local Task Force Lunch Group Meeting Emphasizes Education

The Task Force Lunch Group met for its monthly session this week stressing inter-community leadership, education, discrimination, and non-profit corporate structure. The group is composed of local business owners, organizational leaders and other concerned citizens. They meet monthly to share ideas and work cooperatively to improve their community.

Ms. Annette Colbert, founder and president of Embassy Inc., spoke on non-profit structure and its uses on the state and national levels. Colbert stressed the need for education of local community organizations to update and expand their individual structures. "They must broaden their resource base in order to have more of an impact in the community," said Colbert.

Colbert, who has been involved with various projects in the federal system, stated that the federal employees need to educate themselves within the federal system so they will be more effective in dealing with on the job and human rights.

Ms. Lorraine Marley, educator and career counselor of Rose State College, discussed the academic, and cultural dilemma facing minority students during the early years of the educational process.

"The realities of discrimination within the educational perspective are still prevalent on all levels of academic achievement," said Marley. She continued saying, the process of eliminating discrimination within the educational system has been and will be a long road. Marley

said, "to prepare the minority student for the inevitable eventuality of this dilemma regardless of their level of education, is in part, one of the best educations they could receive."

Professor Archie Edwards of Rose State College, was another of the Lunch Group's guest speakers. He spoke on education from a black historical perspective. Professor Edwards discussed the Dred Scott Decision, from past to present, because of its major impact on black history. He stated that the education of minorities is a vital entity for survival in today's world. Professor Edwards, a Masters Degree graduate of Oklahoma University, is a government and black history teacher at Rose State College. He is said to be a mentor of students.

George Mims, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Greater Oklahoma City Urban League, spoke on the status of Coalition of Civic Leadership's progress of the Tinker Air Force Base alleged discrimination of black federal employees.

Mims stated that there is a definite lack of communication between black leaders and Tinker officials. He stated there is a lack of cooperation, rhetoric, and smoke screens blocking the road to a solution. Mims says, "the reluctance of Tinker officials to give relevant employment information is another road block. He also stated that a more positive alliance between Tinker employees, the black leadership and community residents is the ultimate desired goal.

# Military Methods Reduce Life, Economic Methods Promote Life

President Reagan, in trying to accomplish his ultimate goal in Nicaragua, according to the Defense Information Center, to overthrow the Sandinista Government. The President and House Leader Jim Wright initiated an impossible plan for the Sandinistas, based on the Jeffersonian democracy, that we haven't really affected here.

When the Central American Presidents affected a plan based upon the Contradora plan and President Oscar Arias, of Costa Rica, received the Nobel Peace Prize, Mr. Reagan was dealt a death blow to his request for \$270 million for the Contras. The Administration is trying to use chicanery to get the money, by saying that it will be held in escrow for humanitarian purposes. However, if the Central American plan does not accomplish the desired American goal, then the money will be used for military purposes.

The Center for Defense Information states that the United States has engaged more than thirty times, militarily in Central America. These military ventures or adventures have proved valueless in helping the people. In 1986, President Reagan succeeded in getting from Congress \$100 million; \$70 million for military purposes and \$30 million for humanitarian aid. This only resulted in greater loss of life and more devastation.

Senator Terry Sanford, (D-N.C.), along with seven co-sponsors has introduced a resolution asking the United States government to strengthen the second track which will consist of humanitarian aid to Central America. Senator Sanford said, "Let's renew our efforts in the region, but let's do it wisely, in close consultation with the Central Americans and other nations throughout the world."

Mr. Sanford three mechanisms for accomplishing this goal. The first is to ask the President to let Central Americans be the senior

partners in developing and implementing the plans. The second mechanism is by calling on the President to get other countries to aid in the region. Europe, Japan and other Latin American countries have stakes in the peace and prosperity of Central America. The third mechanism calls on the President to make development aid available only to those countries that have made real progress toward democracy. The Senator suggested that progress could be measured by using the Arias plan guidelines.

Senator Sanford said, "The most through economic planning in the history of the region is underway. It will be conducted by a distinguished International Commission on Central American Development and Recovery which is now being formed."

The formation of a task force and an international commission to develop an economic recovery plan for Central America has been set up at Duke University. It will be composed of experts from the United States and Latin America. The Commission will synthesize existing knowledge on the economic development and reform for Central America and its neighboring regions. The Commission will develop a blueprint for economic progress and will make recommendations to the several governments, central banking organization and to supporting countries.

This project will last eighteen months. At the end of the period, the Commission will publish a final report. An implementation staff will continue after the publication of the report to provide supporting materials for further deliberations. This Study Commission will be funded by foundations.

Rationale for the basis of this Commission is that economic deterioration due to the regional turmoil is exacerbated by external trends, such

as declining trade, scarce foreign capital and interest rates on foreign debts.

Inspiration for this plan comes from the Marshall Plan for Western Europe. It provided aid, debt forgiveness and trade liberalization. It recaptured European markets and investment opportunities. While Central America is a smaller market, it has similar economic, political and diplomatic risks and opportunities.

President Kennedy initiated a Progress Alliance to stimulate development, to promote stability and friendliness among the Latin America nations. The economic growth was limited in El Salvador and Nicaragua by rapid population increase, and in spite of resources devoted to land reform, ownership was concentrated in the hands of the few and many peasants remained landless.

The Commission will address questions of the basic strengths, weaknesses, and prospects of the Central American economics. It will assess impact of financial assistance from the United States and supporting countries, and how best administered for efficiency and equity. The Commission will evaluate lessons learned from past Latin American experiences. It will also determine the impact and costs to the supporting countries for massive aid and trade reform by way of Central America.

Senator Sanford the originator of the Task Force Commission said, "I look forward to the day, when the United States can take the lead in an international effort to help Central America enjoy the prosperity that comes with peace and democracy. When that day comes, we will surely have gained as much as they."

This resolution, if adopted will change the present United States' military method for accomplishing peace and democracy to an economic plan for peace, democracy and stabilization in Central America.

## Phase Three Of Starting A New Business In Oklahoma

In the past few weeks we have been studying and defining various legal formations of business. This week we are going to tackle what America is really made of, THE CORPORATION.

CORPORATION--Although the word corporation calls up the image of bigness, many small businesses choose this form of organization. A corporation exists as a separate entity apart from its owners, the shareholders. It makes contracts; it is liable; it pays taxes. It is a legal "person".

A corporation can attract capital by selling stock in the company to selected investors or to the public. However, small concerns seldom "go public" before they open their doors. Generally, stockholders are not liable for claims against the corporation beyond the amount of their original investment. Creditors have claim only against the assets of the corporation, though officers may become personally liable in some cases.

The separate identity of the corporation makes possible its continuous existence. Death of a

stockholder or sale of stock will not affect the ability of a corporation's managers to continue conducting business.

### SUBCHAPTER S CORPORATION--

The Subchapter S (or tax electing) corporation is a hybrid form (meaning having, or coming from various components) which combines some advantages of the corporate form with federal taxation as a partnership. The Internal Revenue Code permits a closely held corporation to avoid corporate taxation by having each shareholder report his or her share of the corporate income and any dividends received on the individual tax return. The corporation itself files only an information return, just as a partnership does, but remains a corporation in the eyes of the state. An attorney can help clarify the many technical aspects of the Subchapter S corporation, and the other legal forms of business organization, but a word of caution, The Internal Revenue Service is constantly changing their rules, regulations, and guidelines governing various forms of business

as far as the way they are taxed. So always consult a tax account, and/or tax attorney before undertaking these various types of

legal business formations. It is better to be safe than sorry, especially when it comes to dealing with the Internal Revenue Service.

Admission donation is \$5.00 per person, which may be applied toward the purchase price of any item.

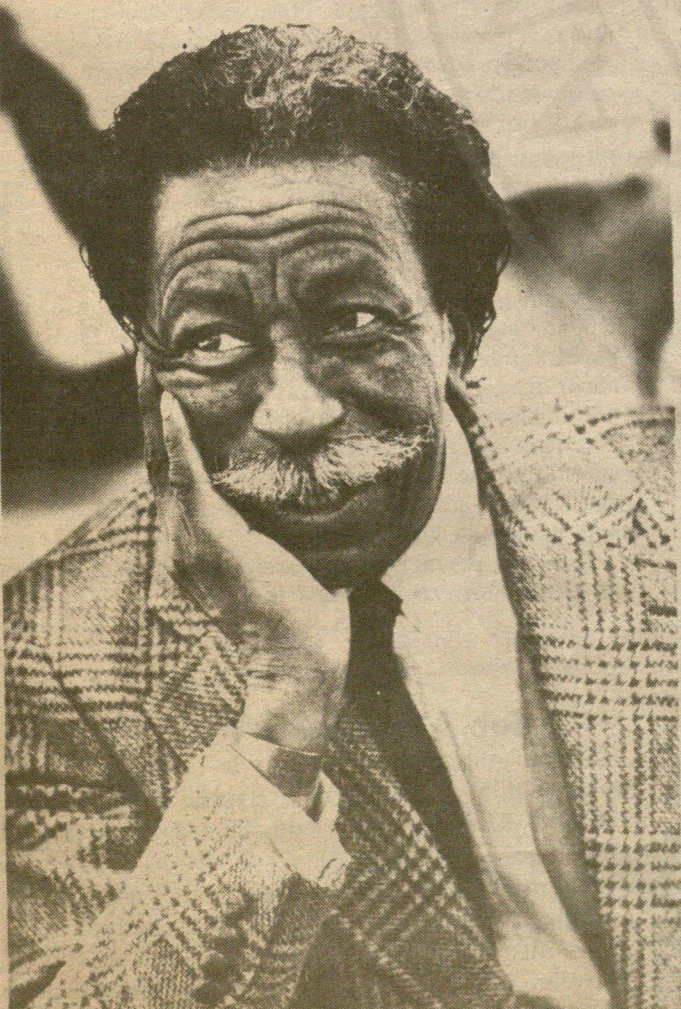

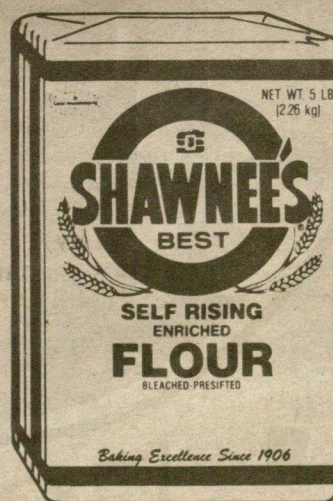
The Ralph Ellison Library will exhibit the work of Gordon Parks, entitled Photographic Moments: The Artistry of Gordon Parks.

## Rice Sparks Everyday and Company Menus

Rice is such a versatile food and goes with so many flavors that it is a popular choice for everyday and special occasion menus.

Buy pork chops when they are on "special" sale in the market, and cook them with a savory tomato sauce and rice to create a hearty family or company meal.

For a special meal featuring chicken or turkey, a rice dish flavored with sweet spices, pine nuts or walnuts and raisins will be especially festive, flavorful and nutritious.

The preparation of *Rice-y Pork Chops* is started on top of the range, then completed in the oven. The chops are browned in a skillet, then transferred to a baking dish. Sautéed fresh vegetables form the base for the tomato sauce, which is then spooned over the rice mounded on the pork chops. After an hour in the oven with no watching required, the flavors of the pork, rice and tomato sauce combine to make the savory one-dish meal.

### Rice-y Pork Chops

- 2 cups cooked rice
- 4 lean pork chops
- 1 tablespoon fat
- ¼ cup diced onion
- ½ cup diced celery
- 2 tablespoons diced green pepper
- 1½ cups canned tomatoes
- 1½ teaspoons salt

- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley

Brown chops in heavy skillet. Remove chops and add onion, celery and green pepper to drippings. Sauté until tender. Add tomatoes, salt, pepper. Simmer 10 minutes. Place chops in baking dish and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Top each with mound of ½ cup cooked rice. Pour sauce over all and sprinkle with parsley. Cover and bake at 350° for approximately 1 hour. Just before serving, spoon sauce over chops.

(Makes 4 servings.)

### Pine Nut-Raisin Rice

- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 cup rice
- ¼ teaspoon each: ground cinnamon, allspice, mace and cloves
- 1 can (10½ oz.) condensed beef broth plus water to make 2½ cups
- salt and pepper
- ¼ cup pine nuts or chopped walnuts
- ¼ cup raisins

Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a large saucepan. Add onion and sauté over high heat until onion begins to brown. Add rice and cook, stirring, 3 to 5 minutes, while rice browns. Add spices and liquid. Heat to boiling, stir well once, reduce heat, cover and simmer for 25 minutes, or until liquid is absorbed and rice is tender. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Meanwhile, brown nuts and raisins in remaining butter until raisins are puffed and nuts are lightly roasted. Blend nuts and raisins into rice. Serve in heated serving dish as an accompaniment to lamb, pork, turkey or chicken.

(Makes 6 servings.)

*Pine Nut-Raisin Rice* is a spicy and sweet rice dish that will complement roast turkey or chicken. The flavor in the dish is developed by browning onion and rice in butter or margarine, then simmering the rice in condensed beef broth with a blend of sweet spices. The butter-cooked pine nuts and raisins are a last minute addition, being stirred into the rice just before serving. If pine nuts are not available, chopped walnut meats may be substituted with equally delicious results.

An Important Comment

To help round out the motivational and ego strengthening begun here in *The ADVANCER*, the teacher or tutor also needs to:

1. Call the student's attention to some role models from their own community which are featured in the community-building newspaper carrying *The ADVANCER*.
2. Highlight for the student the articles and editorials of positive community-building happenings in this same newspaper, which serve to reinforce pride and hope in their future in a "real life" way.
3. Encourage the students to share both *The ADVANCER* and the larger community newspaper with their parents, relatives and friends, who also frequently suffer from similar feelings of hopelessness, despair and lack of pride in themselves.

Parents, relatives and friends who have been blessed with strong egos and a sense of hope still need the exposure to these communication vehicles so they can better relate to the students outside the classroom-type setting and be inspired to do an even better job of role modeling and building our communities. In these ways, our illiteracy victims will become even more secure, hope-filled and proud enough to be motivated to want to learn.

Why do you think Paul Cuffee changed his name? What was the "Kanger"? Why were the White people of Vienna, Virginia afraid of Cuffee? Why didn't some free Blacks want to go back to Africa?

**TEACHER'S AND TUTOR'S GUIDE**

The primary objective of *The ADVANCER* is to serve as excellent supplemental reading for the large number of young people in public (and other) formalized schools where reading motivation, comprehension enhancement and ego-strengthening help is needed. The secondary purpose is to fulfill a basic part of those same reading motivational, comprehension enhancement and image-building needs of our young and older adults not presently in any formalized public school system.

This new learning enhancement tool is being put together on a volunteer basis (there are no paid staff either nationally or locally in AOPP) by experienced professionals who often have varying concerns how (level-wise) such students should be approached. Since many of you, too, have opinions as reading specialists, we welcome your comments and would appreciate greatly your suggestions. Also, we invite—and urgently need—articles for inclusion in *The ADVANCER*. Each article must include a set of questions for use in our *Teacher's and Tutor's Guide*.

Since we may have to combine similar articles and significantly edit others, we feel it is best to maintain a policy of no credits. The objective of all of us is to do what we can to eliminate the awareness of illiteracy wherever it exists.

**General Guidelines**

This guide is primarily to arouse and maintain motivation in the student by continuously highlighting those elements in the articles which focus on issues of major concern to them; address their ego-strengthening needs and sense of self; and convey productive alternatives to preconceived notions and ways of thinking that have hindered them from maximizing their potential.

This orientation can help make the necessary, mechanical process that follows more meaningful and acceptable to the students—something that they can see as making sense and helpful to them. Accordingly, we suggest that you:

1. Utilize the *Who Am I Guide to Learning* if you have total non-readers.

# OUR HISPANIC NEIGHBORS

## VAMOS A COMER!

Latin Americans have many delicious *platos tipicos* (typical dishes) that you will enjoy when you visit their countries. Here are some of these dishes:

You will find a dish called *PAPAS A LA HUANCANA* in Peru and Bolivia. This dish is potatoes covered with a sauce made of peppers, milk, oil and roasted peanuts.

Peru also has a dish that is a lot like potato salad. It is called *PAPAS AL LAMPARIN*. This dish is made of boiled potatoes and hard-boiled eggs in a hot sauce.

Colombia has a potato dish called *PAPAS CHORRIADAS*. The potatoes are topped with onions, tomatoes and cheese.

A hot, cooked cereal is sold in many markets in Bolivia. It is called *PATASKHA*. It is made of ground corn. Sometimes *PATASKHA* is dark, or yellow, or white. The color depends upon the kind of corn that is used to make it. It is always served with a milk sauce called *QUESILLO DE LECHE*.

A dish called *SOPA DE MAIZ* is not soup at all. It is corn pudding made with onions, tomatoes, cheese and milk.

In the markets of Ecuador, you will find a small round corn pancake called a *TOSTADA DE MAIZ*. It is really very good!



### PAUL CUFFEE.....

He made a trip to Vienna, Virginia to buy Indian corn. The southern White people had never seen a ship owned and **commanded** by a free Black man with a free Black crew. They were afraid that their slaves would follow Paul Cuffee.

Paul Cuffee built a schoolhouse on his

own land in Westport, Connecticut. He gave this schoolhouse to the people of the community.

Paul Cuffee dreamed of colonies of free Black Americans in Africa. He spent much of his wealth to make his dream come true. White slaveowners did not want to

free their slaves because they would lose money. Many free Blacks did not want to go to Africa. They wanted to fight for their rights in America.

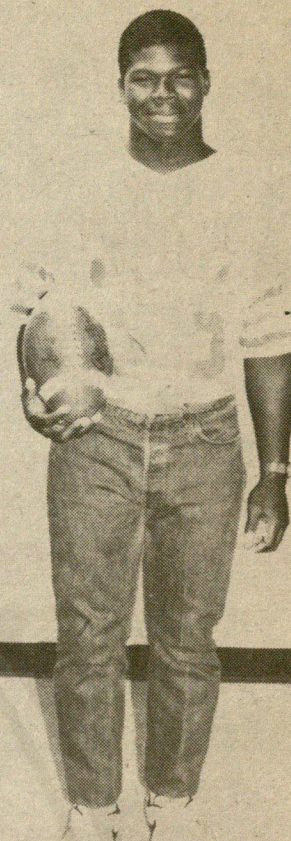
Millwood Falcons junior fullback and kicker Gerald Thomas is this week's KPRW and *Ebony Tribune* prep player of the week.
