Found Dead in Bed

Homicide detectives Thursday opened an investigation into the death of a Logan Heights cafe owner who was found dead Tues-

Her death at first was believed natural. Today it was determined by medical tests that she was strangled to death.

The body of Mrs. Anna Porter, 60, of 3015 Franklin Ave., was found by a friend, Mr. George King of 3217 G Street., when he came to her house at 8 a.m. to take her to her cafe, the Jolly Inn at 140 N. 30th St.

Investigators learned that she had been taken home from the cafe at 11:30 p.m. Monday by two of her employees after she complained of chest pains.

An autopsy Tuesday failed to reveal the cause of death. Minor scratches about her neck were the only apparent injuries.

Coroner A. E. Gallagher said Thursday that further pathological tests revealed that Miss Porter died of strangulation, and that she suffered a concussion over the right ear, and had a bruise over the right eye.

Detective Lt. Mort Greer said a search is under way for a .25 caliber pistol and coin purse which is missing from a cloth sack which Mrs. Porter always carried.

Mrs. Porter is survived by her husband in Arkansas and one sister here, Mrs. Laura Clark, and Mrs. Pearl Allen of Milwaukee, Wisc., Mildred Johnson of Ft. Smith, Ark., and two brothers from Kansas City, Mo., Cole-

We Are Climbing The Ladder Of Success

I was very proud last week, when I read in the Union-Tribune Daily Paper of Earl B. Gilliam passing the State Bar Examination. First, because he is of my race, and second, because he use to be one of my carriers. That was before I began mailing my paper to the subscribers. He use to ride a bicycle and deliver papers, and that makes me feel good that I had a hand in helping him to the lofty position to which he is climbing.

His father and I had a laugh the other day when he remarked to me that he and his wife had to struggle so hard to help him make something of himself. (Quote: Now his next thing is, to try to help him to keep his feet on the ground, and not to hold his head too high in the air and to always remember, it's not the height he climbed, but the depth from which you came) end of quote.

It may sound funny, but I learned there is a lot of logic ir that, and i think Mr. Don Keller should be given a great amount of credit. Mr. Keller is not like some Department heads who spend a lots of time in telling us they don't believe in discrimination, and spend the rest of their time proving to their white mends they do believe in it by not hiring any colored in their department and always explaining.

It reminds me of an old Trainmaster on the Gulf Coast Line of the Missouri Pacitic. He would tell us he did not want us to tell him why the train was late. He said to get here on time, then there is no explaining to do. When I see your time card come into my office marked on time, nuff said. It needs no explaining. So, I say, Earl, go ahead and make good. The Light House Staff is in your corner.

As I use to tell Mr. Roundtree, we need some colored attorneys here in San Diego. Now we have three and one in particular is another young attorney who is making good, Alpha Montgomery, whom, Earl, I think you should consult often. I think he will be glad to help you on your legal way.

South' Employers Use Racism To Block Unions

Southern employers are attempting to maintain the low-wage, open-shop South, by pitting white against Negro, while labor's officialdom slumbers in massive silence.

Benjamin D. Segal in the Nov. 11 New Leader reports how "racism stymies unions in the South." He gives the example of the Bay Springs, Miss. Northern Electric Products Corporation (Neco) where two days prior to an NLRB election, the owners, Ed and Eam Russell, injected racism. The union lost 291 to 86, although this past summer, a majority of Neco workers signed cards saying they were interested in forming an IUE local.

ANTI-NEGRO RANTING

Prior to the balloting, Ed Russell called the workers into the plant lobby where he shouted that the union was "nigger loving" and its president, James Carey, was a "nigger lover." Russell brandihesd the evidence: a copy of the June 4 Jackson (Miss.) Daily News, with a huge four-column photo showing Carey dancing with a young Negro woman. Ed Russell also sent three letters to each worker and made speeches, linking the IUE with activities on behalf of the Negro struggle for equality.

In Jackson, Miss., a similar racist attempt by the management of the Vickers plant proved ineffectual when a majority voted for the IUE anyway. But in Bay Springs and at the Raleigh, N.C., Westinghouse plant the IUE feels that racism was the fatal factor. At Westinghouse, the plant manager told white workers that Nergoes would get their jobs if the union won.

Inside a New Albany, Miss., furniture plant, a company foreman posted pictures of Negroes at a union convention. Along ide was a crudely lettered poster: "Do you want niggers representing you? Then vote 'No' today!" The Upholsterers International Union, AFL-CIO, attributed its defeat partly to White Citizens council activities.

Segal points to a pattern — these are not isolated cases. "Charles Gillman, AFL-CIO director in the Alabama-Georgia-Florida area, reports that White Citizens Councils try to get union members to serve on their executive boards and then attempt to sell them on the idea that union money is being spent on race integration . . . Glilman said, adding: 'It's getting so that in some places the white man won't talk to the Negro and the Negro won't talk to the white man, though they are on the same job.'"

In some instances, racism is causing defections from the unions. Because of a convention mandate calling for the abolition of segregation in its organization, the American Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO, lost the white Atlanta local with 1,500 members. White Chattanooga teachers are also organizing on an independent basis to maintain segregation.

Third Conviction In Mutilation Case

BIRMINGHAM, ALA. — A 45-year-old former industrial worker yesterday became the third Ku Klux Klansman convicted of mayhem and sentenced to a maximum of 20 years for mutilating a Negro man.

Jesse W. Mabry was convicted and sentenced by a circuit court jury which deliberated 58 minutes.

His attorney filed notice of appeal and bond was set at \$20,000.

Two others previously were convicted and given the maximum sentence in the castration of Judge Aaron, 34, a Negro handyman, who was kidnaped, beaten and mutilated by Klansmen Labor Day Night.

Three others remain to be tried.



JUST PLAIN TALK

By Eva Young

Last Sunday morning, at 10 a.m., I motored to Los Angeles, arriving there at 12:30 p.m., at my brother's house at 1308 E. 48th Street, where I got out of the car and stretched for a second and moved over to let him get under the steering wheel, where he drove me to the Olympic Auditorium; to hear Mrs. Daisy Bates deliver her story on the Little Rock Central High School Crises.

That was one of the most heart-throbbing stories that have ever witnessed; when she told of how she and the nine Negro children escaped from being bombed by going in a difderent direction one morning from the way they had always gone out each morning. She told of the many threatening telephone calls that she is stilling getting over her telephone. Although the F.B.I. is guarding her phone and her home is being guarded twenty four hours around the clock, she still receives threats that she is going to be killed for trying to integrate Negroes into the all white Central High School in Little Rock.

Mrs. Bates is a charming woman and treats each person as an individual. She wore a black suit and white blouse and a small black silk hat, with a black feather pointing upward from the back. Her accessories were black gloves and purse, with patent leather pumps and beautiful orchid pinned on her left shoulder.

I was grateful to Mrs. Arthur A. Green, wife of the former District Supervisor of Golden State Mutual Life Insurance Co. of San Diego, who greeted me at the side entrance of the Olympic Auditorium and directed me to the roof of the Auditorium where Mrs. Daisy Bates, Mrs. Tarea Hall Pittman and Mr. Val Washington were seated. As I introduced myself to these great people, and asked them to pose for a picture, they readily bracd themselves and posed for me as they sat in the Buzzard Roof of the Olympic Auditorium.

Mrs. Bates is such a gracious person — it is a pleasure and a privilege to be near her with her warm and friendly

The Rev. Maurice A. Dawkins, president of the Los Angeles branch N.A.A.C.P., told the hundreds who gathered last Sunday to hear Mrs. Bates to not drink any Budweiser beer. He said if you just had to drink beer, what ever you drink, let it be any other beer, ecept Budweiser beer. He said this company was unfair to his people in Los Angeles, because they would not hire any Negroes in their huge Los Angeles plant. He asked the audience to give them \$3000 in their collection, because he said they had to give Mrs. Bates some money for her expenses, and some to carry on the fight in Little Rock, and they had to have some to fight their battle there in Los Angeles. People from various organizations, businesses. churches and personal donations was given to help in the cause. It seemed as though much more than that amount was raised, as it took

four men and two Negro police to guard the money raised, and it took about thirty minutes to count the money and put it Christmas Story in those large bank sacks.

That was a rally that will long be remembered, and the Rev. Dawkins, president of the Los Angeles N.A.A.C.P., complimented the more than six Negro newspapers for carrying full page coverage (paid advertisement in their papers from the N.A.A.C.P. Budweiser Beer fight. The N.A.A.C.P. in other places pays for their newspaper publicity with monies they have in their treasury, but here in San Diego, it makes no difference how much money they have in their treasury, they think the paper should run everything free. They don't think about you having to pay for your labor and products. They think because it's for the N.A.A.C.P., it should be free, They have paid executives in their offices and they don't work for nothing. So I wonder why they think the newspaper should print everything free.

When the San Diego N.A.A.C.P. gives a big dance at the Mission Valley Country Club. I wonder if they tell the proprietor that it is for the N.A.A.C.P. and that he should let them have it free . . . well, the same thing applies to the newspapers, as they are businesses just like the big dance halls and banquet rooms. The Los Angeles N.A.A.C.P. paid hundreds of dollars to those Negro newspapers to print their story about the Budweiser Beer Company. Yet, if it was here in San Diego, the officials would expect for the Light House to run it free, and they pay the big price to some big white organization to let them dance about three and a half hours to the rhythm of four or five hundred dollars. Yet they epect for the Light House to run their publicity free and they give all their money to some white businesses.

We do not know whether the San Diego branch N.A.A.C.P. has made any investigation as to whether the local Budweiser Beer and other cold drink companies employ any Negro help in their hiring policy or not here in San Diego, because this company sells a tremendous amount of beer to the Negro market, and it's no more than right for them to place some Negroes on their payroll. The Budweiser Beer Company has a national payroll of \$39,000,000 wth only two Negroes employed in the Los Angeles area where there is a \$30,000,000 plant.

If the Light House had just a little cooperation from the N.A.A.C.P., Urban League, Ministerial Alliance, Race Relation Society and other organizations, we could get some Negroes employment in San Diego. Instead these, organizations fight the Light House, instead of fighting these causes.


