
Mr. Mickens, started working as a Janitor at the U. S. National in August 1933, after three years in that capacity, he was advanced to a Guard, he was the first Negro for fifteen years, to hold such job at a Bank, he is also responsible for nine Negro people to be employed at the Main Bldg. of the United States National Bank here.

Mr. Mickens, also retired from the USN. as a Chief Petty Officer, after Twenty- four years active duty, he went around the world several times, under the administration of the late President, Teddy Roosevelt.

He came to San Diego in 1921, from Boston, Mass. where he married the former Miss. Cynthia Green, they have no children, both are members of the Bethel A. M. E. Church, Rev. C. Wayne Love, is the Pastor.

Scroll Presented For Valuable Service APPOINTED TO D.



This is the Scroll presented to Mr. Peter J. Mickens, upon his Retirement from the U. S. National Bank on October 30th 1957, after 24 years as a Guard.

He was the first Negro Guard in the State of California, for more than Fifteen years to hold such position at a bank.

His retirement began on October 1st 1957.

Wan Leader Gets 20-Year Sentence

BIRMINHAM, Ala., Nov.-Bart A. Floyd, a Ku Klux Klan lieutenant, was found guilty of mayhem today in the mutilation of a Negro Sept. 1. He was sentenced to the maximum 20 years imprisonment.

Floyd, the second member of the Klan group to be tried in the ease, was accused of performing the mutilation and tossing turpentine on the wound. He was also the second to receive the maximum penalty in conection with the crime.

A jury last week found Joe P. Pritchett, the Klan leader, guilty of maynem. He was sentenced to 20 years. Four other Klansmen

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 .- The Army today said all Negroes in to have married white women in Germany will have transferred to other units before the division reaches its new station in Texas early next month.





Army Switches Negroes Wed To Germans

Army tdoay said all Negroes in the 2nd Armored Division known to have married white women in Germany will have transferred to other units before the division reaches its new station in Texas early next month.

Advance elements of the 2nd Armored are scheduled to leave Germany late this month for Ft. Hood, Tex., and will be followed soon afterward by the remainder of the division. The 4th Armored Division, now at Ft. Hood, will replace the 2nd in Germany.

The Army was confronted with the problem of mixed marriages after it decided to assign the 2nd Armored to the Texas post. Negro soldiers who had married German women were told the state of Texas does not recognize marriages between Negroes and whites.

Civil Rights **Panel Named** By President

WASHINGTON, dent Eisenhower today set up a six-man Civil Rights Commission. established by Congress this year. and named Stanley F. Reed, a former Supreme Court associate justice, as its chairman.

The commission was created after a prolonged controversy in the Senate which finally ended in compromise.

Its purpose is to look into civil rights complaints and make recommendations. It is without power to enforce equal protection for Negroes and other minorities.

Besides Reed, the President appointed these other members:

John A. Hannah, former assistant secretary of defense and who is a member of the faculty of Michigan State University; Former Gov. Battle of Virginia; J. Ernest Wilkins, a New Hampshire Negro and former assistant secretary of labor.
