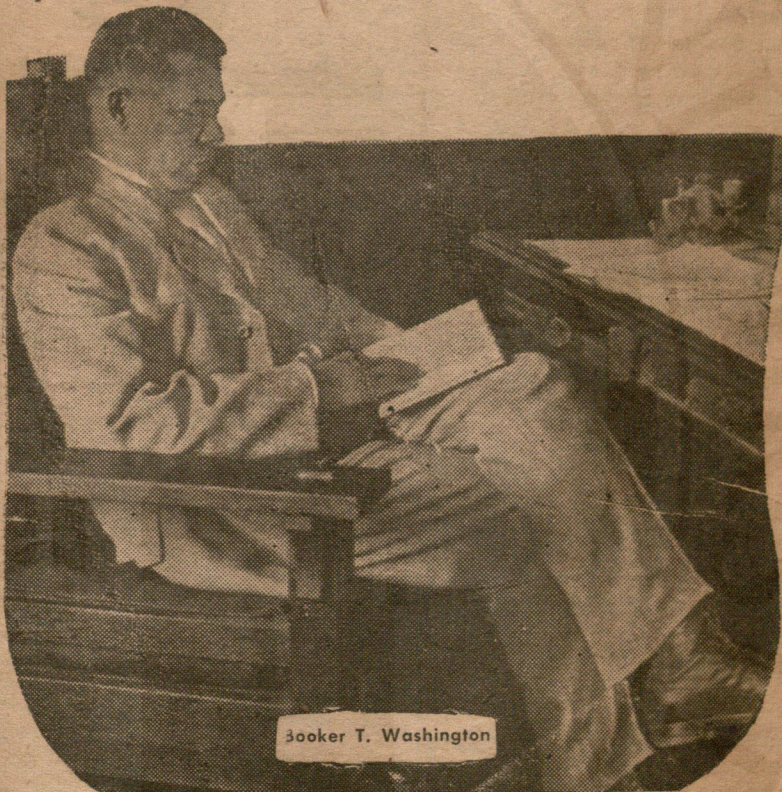

U. S. Makes B. T. Washington Birthplace National Memorial



Booker T. Washington

WASHINGTON—The United States has honored Booker T. Washington, the famous Negro educator and leader, posthumously, by making a public memorial of his birthplace at Rocky Mount, Va.

Fred A. Seaton, secretary of the interior, announced the establishment of the monument which is not a piece of statutory, but will comprise a park built out of the farm which surrounds the log cabin in which the Virginian was born.

Part of National Park System

The monument will be part of the national park system. "It commemorates a great man," said Secretary Seaton, "a man whose ideals have left an indelible imprint and whose life established for his race a pattern of advancement founded on the basic virtues of honesty, industry, thrift and interracial harmony."

Chester L. Brooks, former historian at the Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial park in North Dakota, will have charge of the Booker Washington memorial.

Dr. Washington's birthplace has had an interesting recent history. The white owners of the farm on which the cabin stood wanted to dispose of it. They offered it to Tuskegee in-

stitute. It was the period during the depression and the school officials did not purchase it, so it was put up for auction.

An enterprising salesman who was a graduate of Tuskegee institute, convinced the owners of a popular soft drink manufactured in Georgia, that the project had value. He is said to have bid for the cabin and the small bit of ground surrounding it, using a blank check which his employers had furnished him.

Now National Shrine

There followed a series of exploitative promotions including the issuing of Booker T. Washington half dollars and the establishment of a school near the site. Last April, the foundation, acting in concert with the state of Virginia, de-

Solon Shocked By Alabama's Oppression Of Tuskegees

WASHINGTON—Testimony of raids, repercussions and anti-Negro actions by the state of Alabama against Negro boycotters at Tuskegee were heard last week here by a group of U. S. Senators, one of whom found the story "shocking" in its implication.

W. P. Mitchell and Linwood T. Dorsey, two witnesses at a news conference here testifying in connection with the Negro boycott of white merchants in Tuskegee, told senators of the manner in which Negroes had been denied the right to vote and the way Alabama had gerrymandered them out of the city's voting limits.

Mitchell and Dorsey, both members and officers of the Tuskegee Civic Improvement association, told of raids staged by the state on the organization's headquarters conducted by the attorney general's office and the intimidation suffered by Negroes in Tuskegee.

The news conference at which the Tuskegee leaders testified was called by a group of legislators including Sens. Douglas (D., Ill.), Javits (R., N. Y.), Allott (R., Colo.), Beall (R., Md.), McNamara (D., Mich.), Clark (D., Pa.), Humphrey (D., Minn.), and Carroll (D., Colo.).

Sen. Kuchel (R., Cal.) viewed the story as "shocking."

Mitchell told the solons that Negroes seeking to register were unable to do so for 18 months prior to June, 1957, because "there was no publicly functioning board of registrars."

He said many Negroes would have appeared to register had they believed they could make application. He said that each Negro seeking

Prediction That Came True

Many years ago, Booker T. Washington speaking before
 a mix group of citizens, spoke these words; quote: "If you go on
 allowing these people to go unpunished for lynching, Colored
 some day they will lynch White People," and it sure has been
 done, according to a report from Tuskegee Institute, Alabama.

Later in the beginning of World War II, when the troops
 of Mussolini was burning the barefooted soldiers of Haile Salas-
 sie with hot oil, and he had to leave his country, and American
 Negroes wanted to volunteer, and help him, but the U. S. Gov-
 ernment forbid on the grounds that Italy might consider this
 an unfriendly act, yet American White Boys are fighting in all
 parts of the world; against anybody, that the Imperialist Gov-
 ernment of France or England seeks to oppress. As we of the
 dark races are oppressed, Haile Salassie stood at the Confer-
 ence at Versaille, France, and told the League of Nations; if
 they left him alone to fight Italy, someday they would regret
 it. His words came true, history is repeating itself. The Supreme
 Court has been ignored, where the Monities rights is concern.

Now, young white students have defied the State Depart-
 ment by going to Red China against the rule laid down by the

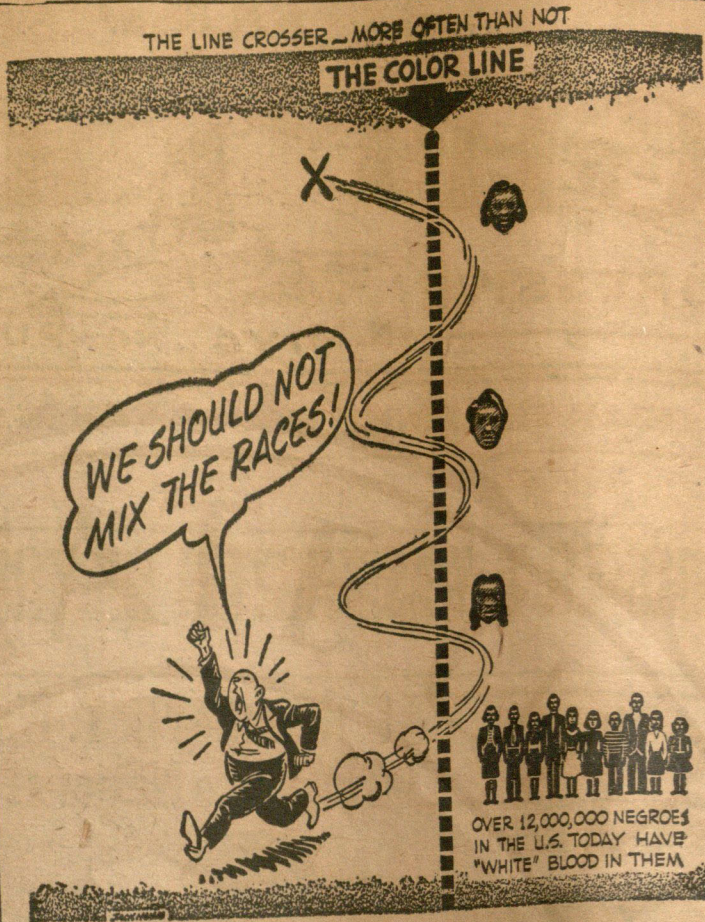
ed the property to the federal

At the age of 16, Booker T.
 made his first bid for an educa-
 tion at Hampton Normal and
 Industrial Institute. He walked
 and begged, rides to travel the
 500 miles to Hampton, where
 he worked as a janitor to pay
 his tuition.

Starts With 13 Students

After graduation, he taught
 school at Malden, Va., but in
 1879, he returned to Hampton
 as an instructor. When Instruc-

tor Washington was 25, he was
 invited to organize a Negro
 school at Tuskegee, Ala. At
 that time the school was
 housed in a small, frame
 church. The lone teacher,
 Booker T., had a class of 13
 students, and his first appro-
 priation for the "new Tuske-
 gee" was the modest sum of
 \$2,000.

Under his leadership and his
 philosophy of training the
 hands as well as the mind, the
 modest schol, 20 years later,
 had grown to an impressive
 40 buildings, and 36 of these
 structures were built by student
 labor.

In 1937, the school was re-
 named Tuskegee institute. It
 now has more than 2,000 stu-
 dents and a faculty of 250
 teachers and department
 heads. Dr. Robert Russa Mor-
 ton succeeded Dr. Washing-
 ton as president, and he in
 turn was succeeded by Dr.
 Frederick Douglas Patterson,
 now a director of the Phelps-
 Stokes fund in Manhattan.

President head of the great
 vocational center is Dr. Luther
 H. Foster, fourth president, who
 has won wide commendation
 for carrying on the traditions
 upon which the great institu-
 tion was founded.

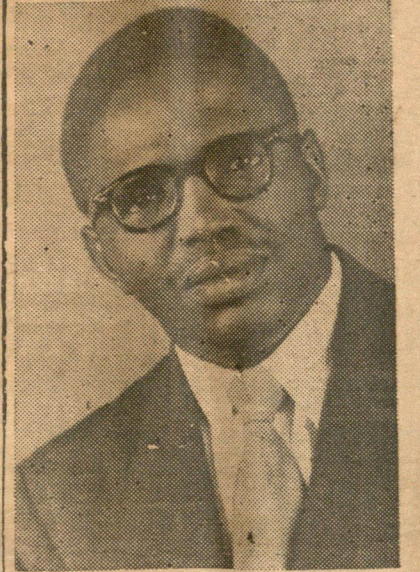

Wants Texas Senator to Resign

GLENDALE, Aug. 16—U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas was called upon to resign as Democratic Senate leader last night by Alan Cranston, president of the California Democratic Council.

Assailing Johnson in an address to the 43rd A. D. Democratic Council in Verdugo Park (Los Angeles County), Cranston said: "If the Democrats were led in the Senate by a man who would fight for what most Democrats want, the civil rights of millions of Americans would now be protected."

"Senator Johnson's remarkable skill is of great service to certain of his Texas constituents, but it is of great disservice to the Democratic Party. I have been warned that to criticize Johnson might injure my potential senate candidacy, but I think it vitally important that at least one Democratic leader in California say publicly what so many have been saying privately about him."

"Senator William Knowland, Republican leader in the Senate must share the blame with Johnson for weakening the Civil Rights bill.

"Knowland opposed Civil Rights consistently until he became a presidential candidate. If he had been experienced in fighting for Civil Rights rather than against them, he wouldn't have been repeatedly outwitted and outmaneuvered by Johnson and other southern senators."

The CDC president took Johnson to task on two other major issues declaring:

"The natural gas bill Johnson favors would increase the cost of heating homes and cooking food for countless American families. The oil depletion allowance he supports forces us to pay higher taxes to make up for the special favors handed to a few multimillionaire oil drillers in Texas and elsewhere."

Wright, born at Durango, Mexico, began his boxing career in 1928. He won the featherweight title Sept. 11, 1941, in Washington, D.C., from Joe Archibald, and lost it to Willis Pep, Nov. 20, 1942.

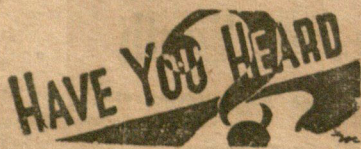
We leave September first, for the middle west, and the Fonzie Lee Thomases for a trip to Washington, Oregon, and Northern California.

Shocked at this statement, Sen. Kuchel asked Mitchell, "You mean that an application was rejected merely because the applicant failed to give the information in the order listed in the question?" Mitchell said "yes."

A move by the Alabama legislature redistricting Tuskegee city limits, excluding some 3,000 Negroes from the city, provoked the boycott of Negroes against white merchants. Mitchell declared that the move by the state gave the city "25 sides" and left only a handful of Negro voters in the city limits.

Mitchell pointed out that in Macon county, Negroes outnumber whites 28,000 to 3,000, but white voters outnumber Negroes.
