Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., leader of the Montgomery, Ala., transportation boycott which ended in the desegregation of that city's buses, will speak here at 8 p.m., June 26, in Russ Auditorium.

Officials of the Southeast Ministerial Association and the Business and Professional Men's Group, sponsors of King's appearance, said the Negro leader will speak on current race relations in Montgomery, his trip to the new commonwealth of Ghana and the recent Prayer Pilgrimage to Washington on the third anniversary of the U.S. Supreme

Court's decision outlawing segregation in public schools.

King, president of the Montgomery, Ala., Improvement Association, has received more than 40 awards for his work on behalf of racial harmony.

Civil Rights

Well it seems what Lincoln said a long time ago. and I have agreed that he was right. Where he said there is no North, no South they are all Americans, it being proven there in the case of Civil Rights.

Where the Bill passed the House and has a better chance in the Senate than it has had in many years—but the peculiar thing is there are many Democrats Senators from the South voting in favor of the Bill and many Republicans from the North voting against the Bill. This proves there is as much prejudice in the North as in the South.

There are as many prejudiced Democrats as Republicans, in other words there is as much prejudice in California as there is in Arkansas, but it's a different kind but we all have our fingers crossed hoping to see a Civil Rights Bill pass that will stop the civilized world from laughing at our so called democratic way of life.

And again (I quote Lincoln) you can fool all the people some time and some of the people all the time—but you can't fool all the people all the time.

Young People Losing Faith in Democracy

City school seniors are democratic thinkers but they are a "generation of sqeptics" about the workability of a democracy.

This paradox was revealed by a Mirror-News poll of 120

seniors in a 'typical' middle-income high school.

It was given to five government classes composed of 75 boys and 45 girls. The poll revealed that tomorrow's leaders are strong champions of most civil liberties but at the same time have little faith in the democratic process.

It also revealed that the trend away from "rugged individualism" has percolated down to the high school level.

A yearning for security is taking its place.

Six out of 10 of the students polled said they believe that most politicians are honest. And it's a good thing because most indicated that Mr. John Q. Public is not smart enough to govern himself.

Some 50% said that most people are unable to vote

intelligently and 61% said that government is become complex for most citizens to understand.

But in the area of civil rights, students stood fa traditional American ideals with one exception, wire tar Some 50% favored legalizing wire tapping to aid police

in their fight against crime. But 88% opposed giving police the right to search with-

out a warrant.

Freedom of speech, 86% of the students thought, should apply to all citizens, even when they promote "unpobeliefs."


of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is a native of Atlanta, Georgia. He is a product of the Atlanta University High School and the Booker T. Washington High School of Atlanta. He entered Morehouse College in 1944 as a Freshman receiving the B.A. Degree from that institution in 1948. After graduation from Morehouse, Dr. King entered Crozer Theological Seminary, Chester, Pennsylvania, where he graduated at the head of his class in 1951. While at Crozer, he served as president of the student body and upon graduating, he received the coveted Pearl Plafkner Award for being the "most outstanding student" in his class during his three-year course of study at the Seminary. He also received the J. Louis Crozer Fellowship, which gave him the opportunity to work toward the Ph.D. degree at the University of his choice. On June 5, 1955, Dr. King was awarded the Ph.D. degree by Boston University in the field of systematic theology

Dr. King has also done work at the University of Pennsylvania, where he took courses in the Department of Philosophy while enrolled at Crozer, and at Harvard University where he was enrolled for two years as a special student

At present, Dr. King is pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church of Montgomery, Alabama. He is the son of Dr. M. L. King Sr. pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church, Atlanta. He is president of the Montgomery Improvement Association, the organization which has guided and directed the bus protest in Montgomery, Ala-

Dr. King has received more than 40 awards for his leadership in the Montgomery Movement. Recently a Gallop Poll revealed that he is one of the most admired religious leaders of the world. Time Magazine has selected him as one



Rights Bill Clears House By Wide Vote

WASHINGTON—The House today passed President Eisenhower's civil rights bill, 286-126.

On final passage, 168 Republicans and 118 Democrats voted for the bill while 19 Republicans joined 107 Democrats in voting against it.

The bill was sped in record time to the Senate, where vice president Nixon is in the chair.

The bill, however, could not be taken up for action since the Senate was in executive session for a continuation of debate on United States ratification of the International Atomic Energy Agency.

Just before final passage, the House defeated 251-158, the Southern Bloc's fourth and final attempt to drive a jury trial amendment into the measure.

Voting for the jury trial amendment were 45 Republicans and 113 Democrats. Against it were 139 Republicans and 112 Democrats.






