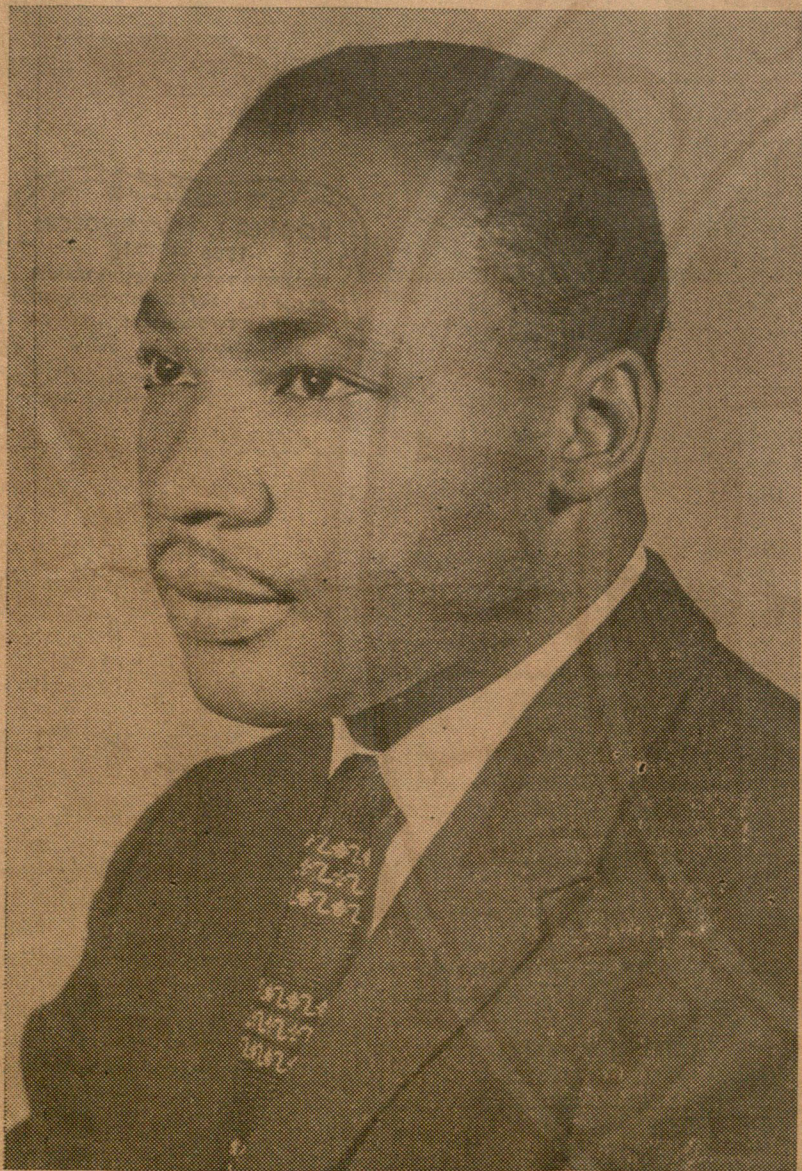

## Dr. Martin King to Speak at Russ Auditorium Wed. June 26

#### Dr. Martin Luther King To Speak Here



DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING

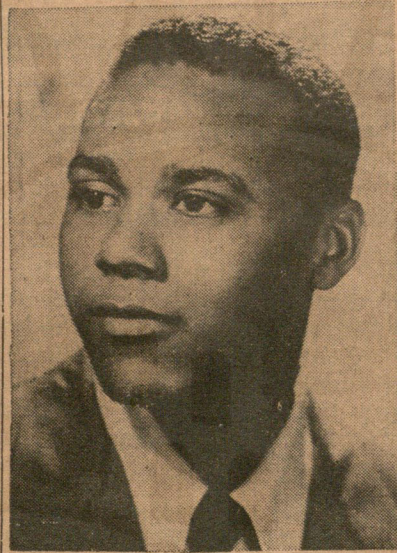
Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., leader of the Montgomery, Ala., transportation boycott which ended in the desegregation of that city's buses, will speak here at 8 p.m., June 26, in Russ Auditorium.

Officials of the Southeast Ministerial Association and the Business and Professional Men's Group, sponsors of King's appearance, said the Negro leader will speak on current race relations in Montgomery, his trip to the new commonwealth of Ghana and the recent Prayer Pilgrimage to Washington on the third anniversary of the U.S. Supreme

Court's decision outlawing segregation in public schools.

King, president of the Montgomery, Ala., Improvement Association, has received more than 40 awards for his work on behalf of racial harmony.

#### Warden Links Coddled Youth To Delinquency

MUSKEGON, Mich., June 15—William H. Bannan, warden of the Southern Michigan prison at Jackson, says juvenile delinquency is the result of mollycoddling by parents.

Bannan said lack of religious training and parental discipline were two reasons why his institution was crowded.

"Treat juveniles like the adults they pretend to be," Bannan said. "We're too mollycoddling with these children of ours."

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church and President of the Montgomery Improvement Association will address the citizens of San Diego Wednesday night, June 26 at 8:00 p.m. in the Russ Auditorium. 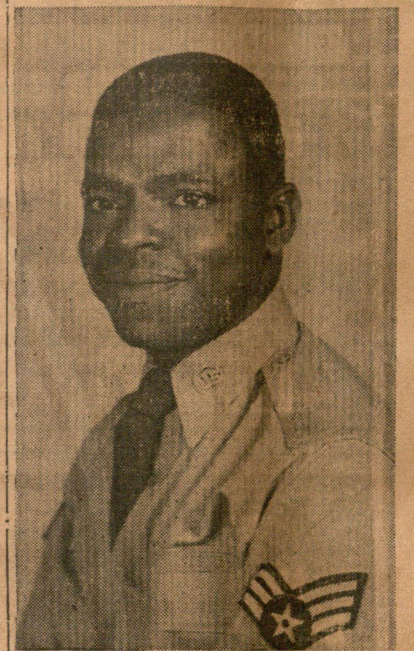

#### El Capitan Emphasizes Need For Second Aqueduct

El Capitan reservoir, its intake tower showing starkly above the water line, is down to one of its lowest points in recent years. Its capacity is 112,806 acre feet. El Capitan holds no Colorado River water but is used as a joint storage facility for the Helix Irrigation district and the City of San Diego. More water from the Colorado River can only be brought to San Diego County now through a second aqueduct which will be voted on by County Water Authority electors at a special election July 9.

#### Air Force Flyer Commits Suicide

Donald J. McRae of 2140 1/2 Irving Street was found dead in his room on June 15.

Donald J. McRae was discharged from the United States Air Force at Edward Air Force Base, in July of 1956. He started to working at Convair in February of 1957.

The Coroner's office states that he had been dead for three days when the body was discovered, and he had committed suicide by taking an overdose of barbiturate. There was also a note found in the room, stating that he was taking his own life. The remains were shipped to Cleveland, Ohio by the Anderson-Ragsdale Mortuary for funeral and interment services.

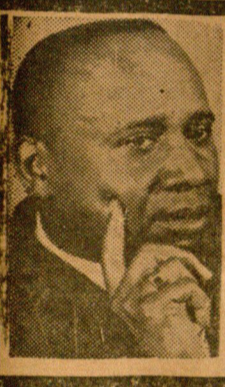

## Civil Rights

## Young People Losing Faith in Democracy

City school seniors are democratic thinkers but they  
 are a "generation of skeptics" about the workability of a  
 democracy.

This paradox was revealed by a Mirror-News poll of 120  
 seniors in a "typical" middle-income high school.

It was given to five government classes composed of  
 75 boys and 45 girls. The poll revealed that tomorrow's lead-  
 ers are strong champions of most civil liberties but at the  
 same time have little faith in the democratic process.

It also revealed that the trend away from "rugged in-  
 dividualism" has percolated down to the high school level.

A yearning for security is taking its place.

Six out of 10 of the students polled said they believe  
 that most politicians are honest. And it's a good thing be-  
 cause most indicated that Mr. John Q. Public is not smart  
 enough to govern himself.

Some 50% said that most people are unable to vote

## Biographical Sketch of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is a native of Atlanta, Georgia. He is a product of the Atlanta University High School and the Booker T. Washington High School of Atlanta. He entered Morehouse College in 1944 as a Freshman receiving the B.A. Degree from that institution in 1948. After graduation from Morehouse, Dr. King entered Crozer Theological Seminary, Chester, Pennsylvania, where he graduated at the head of his class in 1951. While at Crozer, he served as president of the student body and upon graduating, he received the coveted Pearl Plafkner Award for being the "most outstanding student" in his class during his three-year course of study at the Seminary. He also received the J. Louis Crozer Fellowship, which gave him the opportunity to work toward the Ph.D. degree at the University of his choice. On June 5, 1955, Dr. King was awarded the Ph.D. degree by Boston University in the field of systematic theology.

Dr. King has also done work at the University of Pennsylvania, where he took courses in the Department of Philosophy while enrolled at Crozer, and at Harvard University where he was enrolled for two years as a special student in the Department of Philosophy.

At present, Dr. King is pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church of Montgomery, Alabama. He is the son of Dr. M. L. King Sr., pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church, Atlanta. He is president of the Montgomery Improvement Association, the organization which has guided and directed the bus protest in Montgomery, Alabama.

Dr. King has received more than 40 awards for his leadership in the Montgomery Movement. Recently a Gallop Poll revealed that he is one of the most admired religious leaders of the world. Time Magazine has selected him as one of the 10 most outstanding personalities of the year.

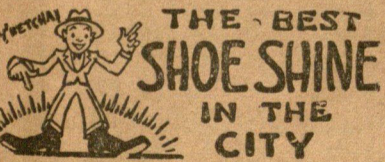

### Rights Bill Clears House By Wide Vote

WASHINGTON—The House today passed President Eisenhower's civil rights bill, 286-126.

On final passage, 168 Republicans and 118 Democrats voted for the bill while 19 Republicans joined 107 Democrats in voting against it.

The bill was sped in record time to the Senate, where vice president Nixon is in the chair.

The bill, however, could not be taken up for action since the Senate was in executive session for a continuation of debate on United States ratification of the International Atomic Energy Agency.

Just before final passage, the House defeated 251-158, the Southern Bloc's fourth and final attempt to drive a jury trial amendment into the measure.

Voting for the jury trial amendment were 45 Republicans and 113 Democrats. Against it were 139 Republicans and 112 Democrats.

Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif), Republican leader, said he is prepared to take "whatever steps necessary" to get Senate approval of the cases of persons whose voting or other civil rights Attorney General to take into federal jurisdiction. The bill would authorize the U.S. Attorney General to take into federal jurisdiction the cases of persons whose voting or other civil rights were violated or threatened.
