Van Deerlin Sets Sights on Funds

Rep. Lionel Van Deerlin, D-San Diego, has urged Congress to extend a legislative program which has already benefited San Diego County by some \$8 million.

Van Deerlin addressed the House Monday in support of a bill introduced by Rep. John A. Blunt, R-Mo., to continue Accelerated Public Works in counties of "substantial" unemployment.

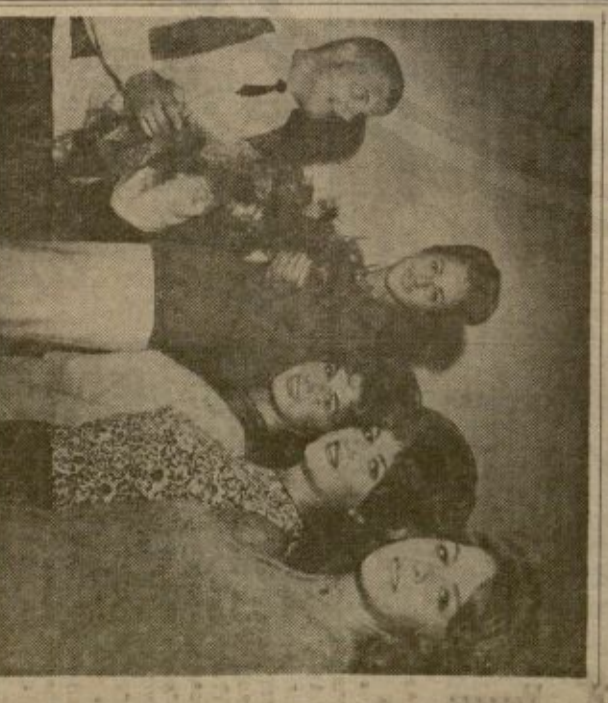
In this move, the Congressman claimed support of the city administration in his home city of San Diego, which has 36 APW applications pending for long-planned sewer extensions, water main improvements, fire stations and libraries.

The cited gains already made in the fight against joblessness.

"BUT IN FEELTY of this year, more than 25,000 persons were still without work in San Diego County," Van Deerlin added. "Our unemployment rate stood at 7.3 percent of the total available labor force—nearly two percentage points ahead of the national average. This is a distinction my community has borne ungloriously since September of 1960."

VAN N. DEERLIN showed a U.S. map with shaded portions indicating pockets of chronic unemployment, both in the San Diego area and the northern Iron Range, Mountain States and the Pacific Northwest.

Under Labor Department standards, a community's unemployment is rated "chronic" if 50 per cent above the national

North Island Gets Safety Award Today

A safety-conscious NAVAL command and a distinguished civilian share honors at an award ceremony at Naval Air Station today. The program will be attended by over 300 key military and civilian personnel.

R-Adm. M. W. White, Commander Fleet Air San Diego, and commander NAVAIR Air Base, 11th Naval District, will present the Secretary of the Navy Award for Outstanding Achievement in Safety to Capt. R. W. Leeman, NAS commanding officer. North Island received the award for the twelfth time in the past 14 years. The award is granted for achievement in all aspects of safety.

During the calendar year 1962 the industrial establishment at North Island Naval Air Station achieved an all-time low of only one injury per every one million man-hours worked. During the same period there was only one motor vehicle accident per 138,000 miles of operation. This, plus the overall effectiveness of the Safety Program, determined the selection of the station for this award.

The Navy Superior Civilian Award will be presented by Leeman to George W. Maice of the Air Station Overhaul and Repair Department. This award is the second highest honor award open to Navy civilians. Maice, who lives at 4133 Boring St., San Diego, is the first North Island employee ever to receive this award.

The award was granted Maice by R-Adm. K. S. Masterson, Chief of the Bureau of Naval Weapons, in recognition and appreciation of superior service which was of exceptional value to the Navy. Maice has been a top management official in the O & R Department for the past 15 years, first as Production Planning Superintendent, then as Shops Superintendent.

Masterson said, in his letter which accompanied the award certificate and emblem: "I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Maice for his devotion to duty and for the significant contribution he has made to the development of the Navy's program of overhaul and repair of aircraft."

Capt. W. Mevner, Overhaul and Repair Officer, will present a retirement certificate to Maice distinguishing service to the Navy Department. Maice will retire tomorrow after 20 military and 13 civilian years with the Navy. His first, last and many assignments have been in the Overhaul and Repair Department, North Island. Maice enlisted in the Navy in 1923 as an apprentice seaman. He advanced from engine dishwasher to production superintendent of the 5,600-man Overhaul and Repair Department during his Navy career.

While a commissioned officer during World War II he held staff positions in which he made important contributions to the war effort through improved methods and systems for aircraft scheduling and production.

Destroyer To Rescue Off Formosa

FORMOOSA—The San Diego-based destroyer USS Halcyon Powell rescued a downed Chinese National pilot airt in a raft for some 30 hours between the Chinese Communist mainland and the island of Formosa, recently.

Halcyon Powell, on patrol in the Formosa Straits, answered a call for assistance and was informed of the pilot's distress. She immediately began a 99-minute search pattern designed to cover an area of 60 square miles each hour.

Meanwhile the pilot, Capt. Chiang, drifted aimlessly throughout the night. He suffered multiple compound fractures in his right arm when he ejected from his F-100 jet fighter.

The next day, the destroyer's carefully plotted search pattern paid off. At 10:24 a.m. lookouts reported sighting the orange life raft several miles ahead.

Once safely aboard the Powell, Capt. Chiang received emergency treatment for shock and his fractured arm. Halcyon then headed for Kaohsiung.

LEMON GROVE—Ground dining rooms with seating facilities for 250 persons. The new dining room will be under the supervision of a Granate described diets.

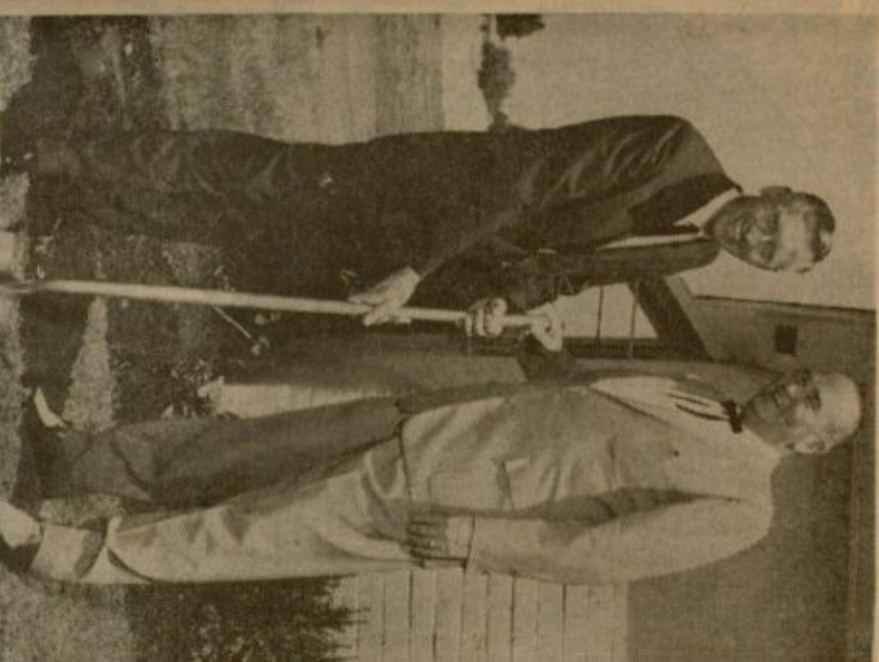

Attending the special morning session will be Mrs. Barbara Hutchinson, president; George Maloof, first vice president; George O'Brian, second vice president; M. A. Roggenkamp, board members and Lindsey Chabonne, a member.

Mrs. Hutchinson said the society, formed recently, is the first of its kind in the United States. She said the meeting with Caplin is aimed at a "re-evaluation of taxing procedures" for U.S. Treasury card holders for tax practitioners" and to discuss the current proposal of the House Ways and Means Committee for tax change in 1964.

The society's goals are to emphasize and perpetuate the prestige and status of the tax consultant profession through a 19-point program.

During tax season the unsuspecting public is often bilked by "seasonal" tax consultants who set up shop during tax season and vanish afterwards, said Mrs. Hutchinson. The society hopes to qualify consultants, train them and assist them in order to help the general public and the profession itself.

She said, "Now is the time to start this type of training before the season is upon us."

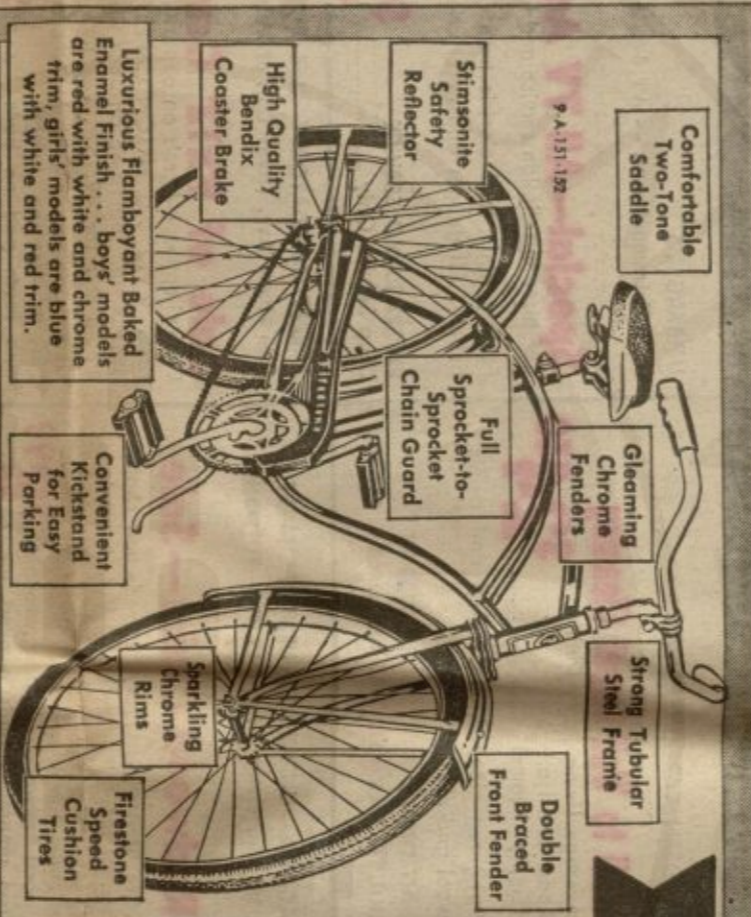

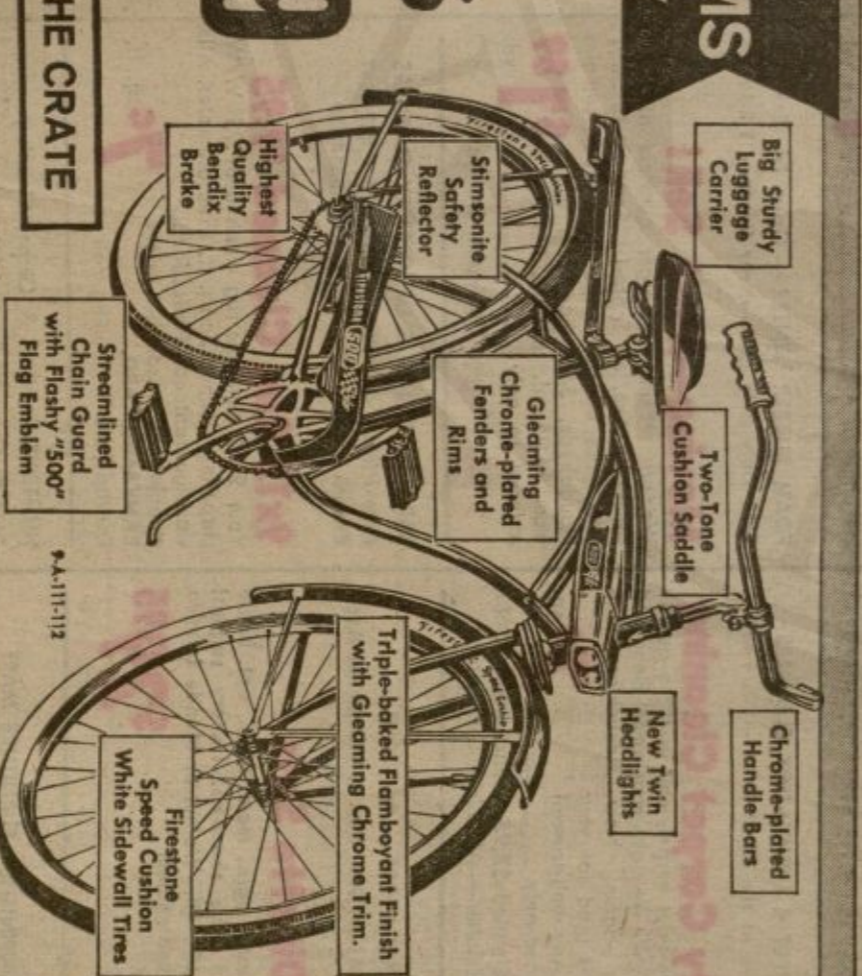
