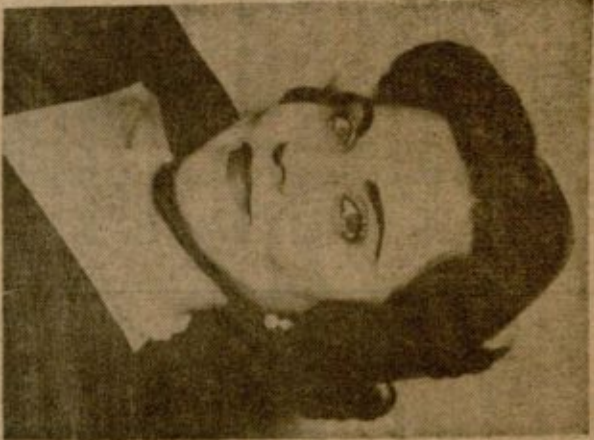


Ann Landers Talks to Teen-agers About Sex

I am the shoulder to cry on. I sit in the wheelchair seat, and it's not difficult to understand why. It's easier to level when you don't have to look a person in the eye and recite the agonizing details of an episode you're ashamed of — particularly if that episode involves a triumph of human chemistry over sound judgment.

For this reason I've been cut in on what goes on behind closed doors and drawn drapes, in the back seats of family cars, on sandy beaches, in wooded lanes — wherever boy meets girl.

Glorious teen-age years! Laughter, fun, popularity, dancing barefoot at proms, exchanging ID bracelets, rings, look-alike sweaters, hours of love talk on the telephone, romance under the stars. Pure bliss.

Who says so? Pre-teens, post-teens (with faulty memories), everyone — everyone except the teens themselves. They know better. And I know better, too. Mountains of mail from the most reliable source of all — teen-agers themselves — tell a different story. A staggering number of teens who appear to be cool, calm and confident, in simple truth, are anxious, frightened and guilt-ridden. They are pulled and hauled by biological urges on the one hand and fear of the consequences on the other.

On Cloud Nine or Behind the Eight Ball

First, let's define our terms. Who is a teen-ager? You may as well ask "Who is man?" or "What is life?" Webster's Third New International Dictionary, which bulks 2,270 pages and cost \$3.5 million to produce, offers this definition: "Teen-ager: a person between 13 and 19 years of age, inclusive." Big deal!

If Webster's can't come up with a better definition, then what I've long suspected must be true. There is no such animal as a typical teen-ager. He can't be defined because he doesn't exist. Yet we can

scarcely pick up a magazine or a newspaper which doesn't have an article on "What Teen-agers Want" or "What Teen-agers Need" or — worst of all — "The Moral Decay of the Youth of America."

Adults who talk about teen-agers in unharassed generalities do all our kids an injustice. Teen-agers are not *inna beans*. They are human beings who come in assorted sizes, shapes and colors. Each has his own personality, his own sense of personal worth and his own moral and ethical value system.

The difference between age 13 and age 19 can be 100. I've received letters from 15-year-old girls who have had so many sexual experiences they can't recall the names of all their partners. In the same batch of mail I might receive half a dozen letters from 16 and 17-year-olds who want to know if it's possible to get pregnant through clothing.

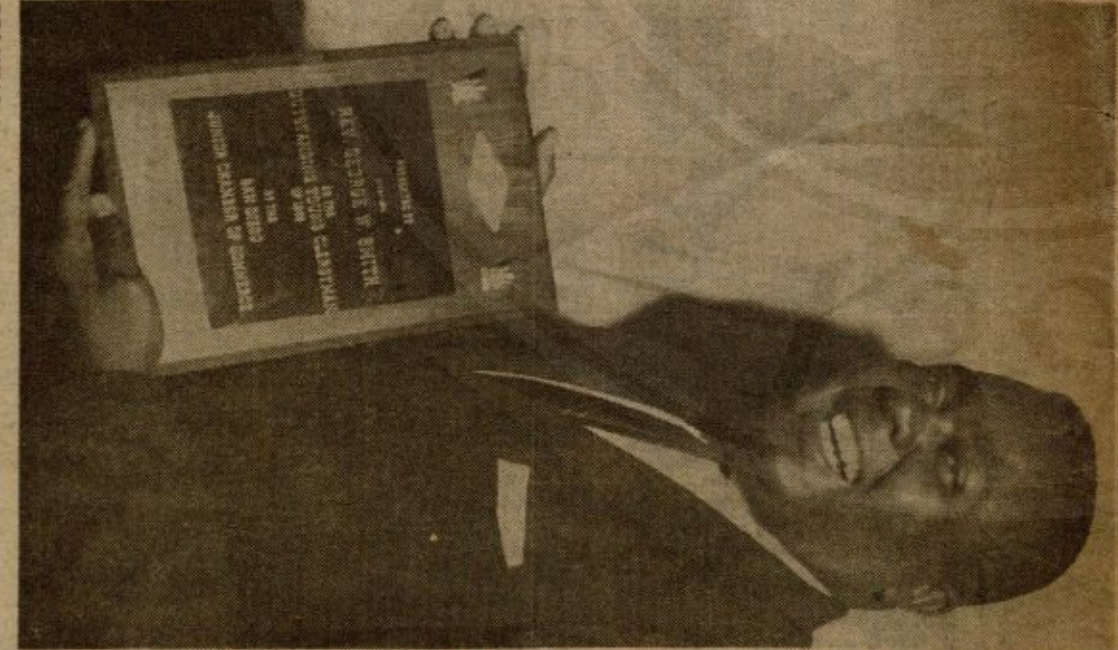
CORRECAPS Mayor for His Opinion

Official Defends Policy

'All People Get Entrance Under System'

Workings of the quota system as it affects immigrants were explained this week by Alfred Edgar, officer-in-charge of the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, 2225 El Cajon Blvd.

"In 1952," Edgar, told The Independent, "the Walker-McCarran Act liberalized the acceptance of all people into the United States as a result of sentiment in this direction started in 1944. Actually, during the period 1923-40, almost five million immigrants were admitted to the United States with almost four million of that number entering during the 20's."

Quoting from a handbook on policy, "In 1921, Congress passed a quota law which was the first legislation placing a limit on the number of immigrants who could come to the United States. The quota was based on the 1910 census."

Interest in ground rules for immigrants is currently taking an upswing, induced on proposals for revision of laws governing the entry of foreigners into the United States which have been placed before President Johnson by Rep. Michael Feighan, D-Ohio, chairman.

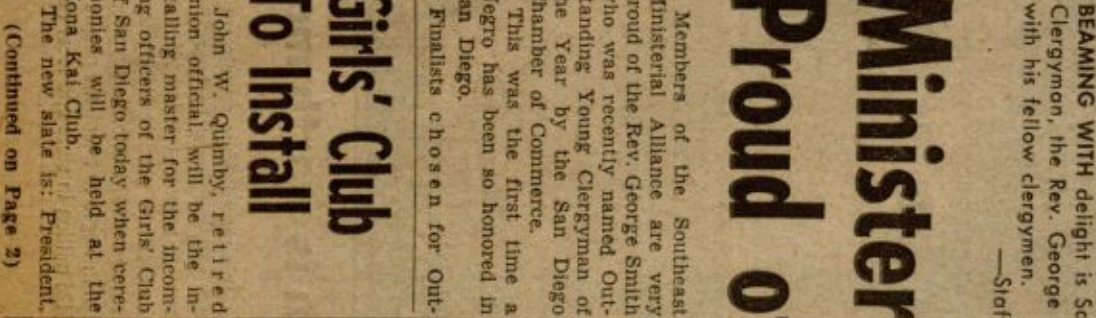
Discrimination in Employment and Accommodations was the subject of a panel discussion this week under the auspices of the American Civil Liberties Union held at Hospital Park.

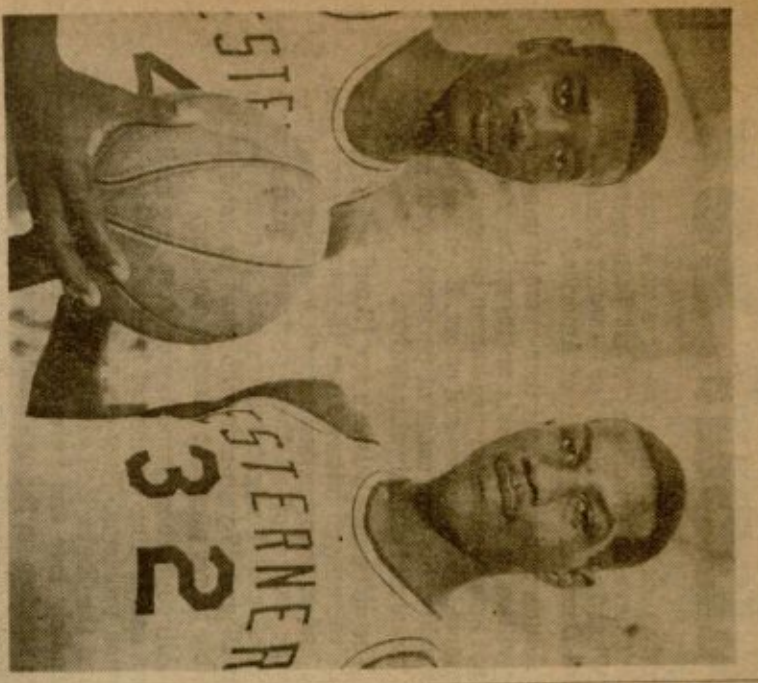

(Continued from Page 1) UNCONFIRMED reports in this connection, generated by notification of plans, by recently independent African-Asian nations to immediately institute a quota system of their own to govern the entrance of Americans to their cities.

THIS WAS SEEN as a retaliatory measure provoked by national pride often colored by memories of painful and embarrassing incidents suffered by these people who are said to resent the impression in this country that Americans should be allowed a one-way "unrestricted welcome everywhere. Further concern at this time is centered around the possible strategic materials and friendly intercourse with these nations of the Free World whether to alien themselves or to ally with the Communist bloc. Evidently concerned with a wave of African and Chinese nationalism and of the real significance of retaliatory measures, pockets of alleged sensibility were depicted as misunderstandings because an American falls have been American people motivated by fair standards and are due to nothing that could imply bigotry.

VAN DERLIN also reports: The Naval Repair Facility could possibly be leased by the Navy and provide employment for 20 to 30 per cent of the present work force now employed there. The Veterans Administration Hospital budgeted for 1964-66 and projected for construction in 1967 "may" get built two years earlier than planned."

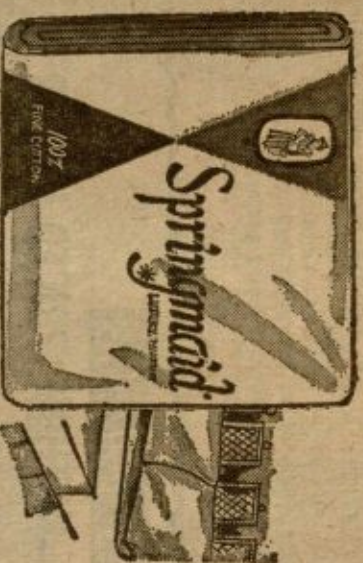

Today's Teen-agers Far Ahead' of Yesterday's

They struggle with acne, overweight and underweight, and the sweet and frightening mysteries of awakening biological drives. They're bedeviled by peppy brothers and sisters, wall over impossible math courses, and hunger to be popular.

They die when they are left out. They want to be exactly like everybody else—right down to the skinny pants, the beak-up speakers, the bulky sweaters or whatever happens to be "in" at the moment.

Alexander, Graham Bell is their patron saint. To the teenager the telephone is vastly more than an instrument of communication. It is an emotional outlet. The tinkle of this magical gadget can send a 15-year old into ecstasy. A silent phone can plunge a teen-ager into the coils of despair.

One thing is certain: After 12 and up to 20, life is not easy.

A Kooky Generation?

Are teen-agers today wilder than their parents were at a comparable age—or are they just getting more public attention? I am asked this question frequently, particularly by parents. They usually put it this way: "Are our children worse than we were when we were their age?"

I don't like the word "worse." The teen-agers of today are different from teen-agers of 30 years ago. My answer is not based on memory. It is based on statistics. Anyone who has been working with young people since World War II will tell you that more teen-agers are in trouble today—more serious trouble, and at an earlier age—than ever before. And it isn't just that there are more teen-agers.

The percentage of adolescents in trouble is up.

What are the reasons? Have today's teen-agers invented a new kind of mischief? No, they have not. They are doing, essentially, the same things their parents did—but they are doing them sooner. And this is where the trouble comes in.

SINCE WORLD WAR II, the timetable of sex activity among teen-agers has been set ahead by approximately three years.

WHEN I WAS A teen-ager (back in the Stone Age, of course) 13-year old girls didn't wear nail polish, nylon, strapless evening gowns and lipstick. A 14-year old boy who smoked usually did it behind the barn. There wasn't the social pressure to "grow up." Our mothers didn't worry so much about whether or not we were popular. Back in the 1920's, mothers were worrying about other

adult schools.

A full time counselor is now available at Midway. A full time school but appointments should be made. Midway is also holding classes at Point Loma Evening High School.

The range of instruction at all of the schools is broad, starting with basic academic subjects on through practical vocational courses to fine arts and homemaking.

Veterans may use educational benefits under federal grants and serventure in many states for an adult high school diploma with two credits in United States History and two in United States Government if they make satisfactory scores on the General Educational Development (GED) test and if they meet other requirements.

If they have already taken the two courses listed, they must earn at least two semester credits in residence. Military schooling may be evaluated by application if credit is not given for GED test score.

The radio program is a mood music. The floor compartment can accommodate a few cans of beer or a bottle of booze. If it's cold outside, you can turn on the heater. If it's hot outside, you can turn on the air-conditioner.

NATURE'S WONDERS can be glorious and stimulating. Safe in a car you can watch the stars twinkle in the heavens, listen to the howling wind or the gentle patter of the rain. With a set-up like this, it's not surprising that half the kids who write and say they are in serious trouble admit it happened in a car.

AM I SUGGESTING teen-agers should not be allowed to have cars? I am not. That would be absurd. Cars are built into twentieth-century life. We can't turn back the clock or the calendar, nor should we wish to.

I am strongly suggesting, however, that teen-agers should recognize that a car presents multiple temptations which can add up to deep trouble. Even the most disciplined boy or girl is battling against primal odds when he parks in the moonlight "just to talk."

A kooky generation? No. A troubled generation, struggling not only with the problems of growing up but with the added pressures of the space age—a generation forced to live in a world it never made. But what new generation ever made the world it came into.

The year's losers, in addition to Silvers, were, of course Jerry Lewis and Glynnis, and Judy Garland and Grind.

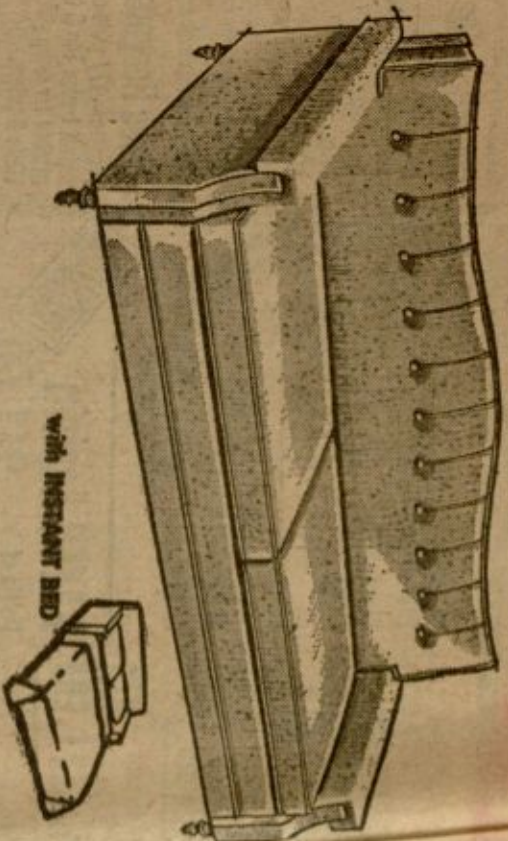

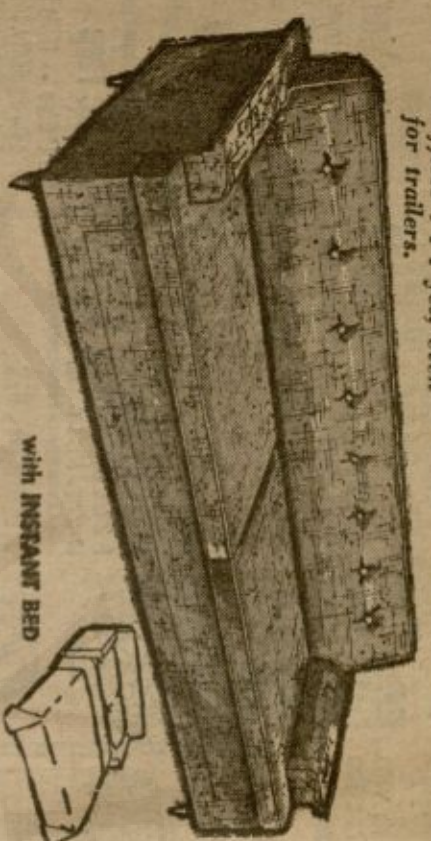
Danny Kaye, November 7 in the "excellent" column, is the one star to show staying power, but he's also one with limited past television exposure.
