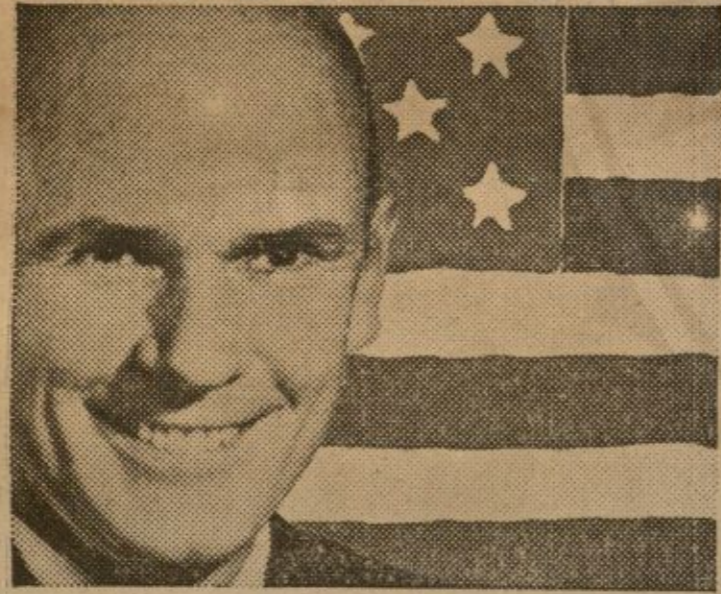

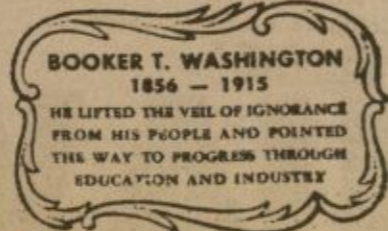

### Dr. Martin L. King at Cal-Western Friday

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., selected by Time Magazine in 1963 as Man of the Year and "The unchallenged voice of the Negro people and the disquieting conscience of the white", will deliver a free address open to the public on Friday, May 29 at 8:00 p.m. in Golden Gym on California Western University campus in Point Loma.

Dr. King states, "My coming to California is two-fold in its purpose: First, to mobilize the liberal forces to push passage of the pending civil rights legislation without crippling amendments; secondly, to marshal every possible resource to defeat the Initiative amendment in November." His address will be entitled "Effective Civil Rights Legislation Now - National Impact of California's Constitutional Amendment Initiative"

Organizations sponsoring Dr. King's visit include San Diego County Council of Churches, San Diego County Ministerial Association, Southeast Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance, Western Christian Leadership Conference and the Associated Students of California Western University.

A noted author and lecturer, Dr. King holds a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Boston University and numerous honorary degrees from colleges & universities throughout the country. He has traveled extensively in Europe, Asia, South America and Africa, lecturing on the subject of race relations.

At present Dr. King is Co-Pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church, Atlanta, Ga., President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, Atlanta, Ga. and President-Emeritus of the Montgomery Improvement Association, Inc. (The organization which guided and directed the bus protest in Montgomery, Alabama.)

Continue from Front Page STOCKTON SCHOOL

Stockton school is not a newly-established school. It was originally established in 1912

and expanded to the familiar two-story structure in 1915.

The present modern site is a single-story school designed by J. Thomas Eschul and built by the Rika Construction Co., Inc. of San Diego. It contains 17 classrooms, two kindergarten and an administrative-health units. The auditorium-cafeteria unit is not new, but was remodeled.

The new school has been in use since the start of the school year and currently has an enrollment of 890 children and 31 teachers.

Stockton school is named after the first governor of California, Robert F. Stockton, who was also a distinguished naval officer and senator. Stockton was instrumental in winning Southern California for the United States and has a record of over 50 years of service to his country.

Principal Jack Thompson announced open house and classroom visitation.

"Jacob's Ladder" and "This Train" was sung by The School Chorus, directed by Mrs. Geraldine Coley. Presentation of Guest by Dr. Orville B. Aftreth, Assistant Superintendent. Dad Ritar wand dlade ups Colors and Pledge, by Stockton Safety Patrol, Invocation was by Rev. Arthur Tsuneishi of the San Diego Fishness Church & the Benediction was given by Rev. H. V. Bennett, pastor of Macedonia Baptist Church. Refreshments were served after the close of the program.

The auditorium was filled to almost capacity.

### Is Christiaity the World's Best Religion?

We have to-day in America the greatest church building program ever, some of the most modern and beautiful churches are found in the deep South, but are these churches fulfilling the Christian requirements of our times without regard to class or race. Every Christian in these critical times of competitive struggle, is confronted by these words of Jesus, "As I have Loved You, So Love Ye One Another or, if a Man Say He Loves God and hate his brother, he is a liar and the truth is Not In Him." If we continue to ignore the teachings of Jesus, as set forth in the New Testament social gospel, God has no other choice but complete destruction. This has been the pattern of human history from the time of the "Exile." The prophets proclaimed the word of Jehovah but to no avail. The people went headlong to destruction in Babylonian slavery. "YES, CHRISTIANITY IS THE BEST RELIGION IN THE WORLD"

In spite of the human element involved, the nations of the Western World have done more in the way of human progress along all lines of interest, than those nations who have not accepted Christianity as their basic faith. The great cardinal principles by which humanity was lifted came from the nations of the west. It was in England that the Magna Charta was written, it was in America that the Bill of Rights was formed, it was in France that the Divine Rights of Kings came to an end, it was in Italy that the Renaissance threw off the shackles of religious superstitions and fears and opened the door to scientific knowledge and a critical examination of established truth. Democracy is a product of the West, even though we have not fully realized its meaning. It stems from the basic teachings of Jesus found in the New Testament Scripture.

Christianity has awakened the consciousness of man to the needs of the world and its service to humanity as no other religion has. In spite of man's will power and self-determination, long as the light of Christianity shines in the minds and consciousness of man there is hope for the world because the time will come, & come it must when the peace of God will be proclaimed by all men the world over.

The league, bought the majority of the equipment for the school. A few items were donated by some merchants on the avenue.

The Superior was Miss Nadine Redwood and Miss McKinney was her asst. We were not able to hire all help, the league did part of the work on a volunteer basis. The league even furnished the milk for the children. We sold dinners, put on plays, and held public meetings to raise funds.

The League had the grand-opening Day this photo was taken. These were official members of the Child Care Committee. During the war the requirements for the school demands out grew the league and they were taken over and put in larger quarters in the Bethel Baptist Basement.

Alan Cranston, Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate, announced that John Anson Ford, former Los Angeles County Supervisor and Democratic National Committeeman, had been named chairman of the Senior Citizens for Cranston Committee.

Ford, chairman and a two-term member of the California Fair Employment Practices Commission, issued this statement:

"Cranston, as an elective state official, has consistently fought for liberalization of old age benefits, and is a leader in the drive to assure decent housing for older citizens displaced by urban redevelopment."

Ford also supports Cranston's "Older Citizens' Bill of Rights," which the candidate announced recently.

Ford, who served on the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors for 24 years, also is a member of state and county commissions studying the problems of the aged. He also originated the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations.

more church-sponsored programs of remedial and tutorial instruction to help Negro youth to overcome gaps in their educational backgrounds and prepare them for opportunities arising out of the "Age of Automation".

Dr. Sherman L. Greene, Jr., of Nashville, Tennessee, Secretary of the A.M.E. Department of Educational Institutions termed education of Negro youth "one of the most critical problems of our time." "We are plugging with social dynamite," he said, "as long as we permit our youth to carry their frustrations to the streets for settle-

ment. The urgent need for mature, intelligent leadership is quite apparent in this crisis and we must do more to provide it."

Speaking for the nine A.M.E. College Presidents, Dr. Greene called on President Johnson to attack "Educational Poverty". He pointed out the problem of providing quality education in private schools that are predominantly Negro is mainly one of adequate financing. Dr. Greene said that the Federal Government must invest more in education even where the schools effected were Church-related or Church-sponsored. Any problems arising out of this touching on our traditional Church-State relationship will be resolved, he said.

Discussing the Higher Educa-

tional Facilities Act of the Federal Government, Dr. Greene called it a step in the right direction but stated that it was too little for too few. One particular problem pointed out in this Federal legislation is the

Sunday afternoon, May 24th from 2:00 to 4 P.M. in the Sherman School Auditorium, 22nd and Island Avenue, the staff and P.T.A. of Sherman School will honor Mr. Maurice B. Ross who, after 41 dedicated years with the San Diego City Schools, will retire in June.

Perhaps no one man in the entire southeast San Diego community is respected and loved by as many people as Maurice Ross. His contributions to education during the past 41 years are too numerous to name. He has spent the last 21 years as the principal of Sherman School and this in itself, is a unique situation. Although he has had many assignments during his long career in education, it could be said that "Mr. Sherman School" is the title that fits him best.

Maurice Ross was raised in San Diego. His father was also an administrator for the City Schools. Just a few years ago the Pete Ross Elementary School was dedicated in tribute to the many years of outstanding service given by the father of Maurice Ross.

After attending elementary and high school in our city, Maurice Ross went on to Cal Tech where he earned his D.S. degree. He later attended Stanford University where he got his Master's degree and administrative credential. He returned to San Diego in 1926 to begin his teaching career at the then new Wilson Jr. High School. After serving at Wilson for two years he moved to San Diego High School and taught math from 1928 to 1931. He served as a one-man research department for the district from 1931 to 1934 and later began his career in administration, consisting of teaching half time, and acting as principal half time.

In 1936 Mr. Ross moved to the central office of the school district and was appointed Assistant to the Superintendent & Secretary of the Board of Education. For seven years he served in this capacity, but in 1943 he chose to return to the schools and was assigned to Sherman

Elementary School as principal.

Many people living in the Sherman School area were admirers of Maurice Ross when they were students. Now their children look with respect and admiration on him as their principal. It would be difficult to count the number of boys and girls whose lives have been enriched by the quiet-voiced gentleman with the gray hair and sprightly step.

**A.M.E. Church delegates report Brutal experience in traveling to Gen Conf.**

Speakers for the South Carolina, Georgia, and Mississippi delegations to the A.M.E. General Conference told the Conference that long distance travel to the Conference on the highways of their respective areas was a brutal experience for Negroes.

The groups related their collective inconveniences and petty humiliations, even for essential personal needs of Service Stations, some nationally franchised. The Conference was told by Bishop George W. Baker of Philadelphia that the situation clearly underscored the need for strict Federal legislation against racial segregation on interstate highways.

The statement of the group followed adoption of a resolution to thank President Johnson for giving priority to the Civil Rights Bill and urged him to press for an immediate end to the Washington Station.

To emphasize their concern for Civil Rights, the Conference delegates voted unanimously to devote an entire business day (Monday, May 18th) to Civil Rights strategy and planning for action in the months ahead.

Bishop Joseph Gomez of Detroit, who will preside on Monday announced that Civil Rights Awards would be presented to Walter Reuther and A. Phillip Randolph, labor leaders and active civil rights leaders.

Denominational Civil Rights activists, one from each Episcopal District will also receive an award at the Monday evening (8 P.M. ceremonies.)

question of control by Local and State Boards of Education which, Dr. Greene said, carry with them the local prejudices against giving Negroes equal treatment even where expenditures of tax funds are concerned.

In many cases, he said, Negroes are deliberately left out of programs of general nature, in many respects this will create the same set of problems that now plague the nation with respect to the ballot and the free exercise of the right to vote.

Dr. Greene concluded his statement with a reminder that Federal scholarship grants and loans were not now reaching young people in families of low income, a fact which he said, tended to eliminate the majority of Negroes eligibles. He stated that most of the grants were going to families with income overages of \$12.00 to \$13.00 per year.
