STAGES "CHAIN-IN:"

CORE Goes Into "Hard Push" Action Against SDG & E Co.

CORE kept its promise . . . to the people.

As a result of its "direct action" movement on Monday, each member of CORE and each supporter marching the picket line has been served with a court restraining order.

THE SAN DIEGO Chapter of the Congress of Racial Equality went forth almost on the eve of Christmas—early Monday morning—and began its demonstration push against the San Diego Gas and Electric Company by staging the first "Chain-In" in this city's history.

Led by CORE chairman—Hal Brown—members and supporters chained themselves together in front of both the E Street and Sixth Avenue entrances to the Gas and Electric Company building. Inside the rotunda of the building, more demonstrators staged a "Sit-In" on the floor.

COMMUNICATIONS between the officials of CORE and the spokesmen for SDG & E Company ceased when the company turned down CORE's proposal which included the hiring of Negroes on an equal basis with whites.

Flash!

The San Diego Chapter of CORE, in a highly confidential meeting, unanimously voted to ignore the injunction order served on individual members who demonstrated on Monday, and continue its "beefed up" direct action by placing a maximum of five people per day in the picket line and passive resistance human chain-in on Thursday and Friday. This means that CORE members are ready to pay the supreme price and sacrifice liberty if, by ignoring the order, they are jailed!

As jobs became open. Last Thursday evening, CORE held a mass meeting which drew hundreds into Jackson Memorial Church for the purpose of clarifying CORE's stand on equality of job opportunity where the Gas Company is concerned.

Chanting their official song, "We Shall Overcome," CORE demonstrators quietly lined up and seated themselves inside

the office building's foyer. Others formed a human chain across the entrances to the building.

AT THIS POINT, Gas Company aides opened up one side entrance, only for customers coming and going into the building.

At 3:20 p.m., San Diego Po-

Division Title Won By Chargers

ice officers left their guarded stand outside the building. Several prowler car officers had been stationed across the street from the Gas Company during the afternoon hours of the demonstration.

At approximately 3:10 p.m., a man, apparently by accident, rammied a hand cart into two of the demonstrators, Maggie Poe and Peggy Finch, with such force that he, allegedly, injured both of them. Miss Poe's left shoulder was in pain as she left the picket line for a physician's treatment.

DURING THE afternoon's "Chain-In" demonstration, all Gas and Electric Company customers coming and going in and out of the building were forced to step high over the bodies of CORE members and friends.

Monday's action had begun at 9 a.m. in front of the company's employment office. During the weeks of demonstration, the company has been moving its employment office from location to location on various streets in San Diego. CORE members have been following and staging picket lines.

Civil Rights Took Top Spot In Local News Summary for 1963

IN THE YEAR, just ending, headlined by death, disaster and demonstrations, San Diego Negroes distinguished themselves by programs and actions in the civil rights arena.

As Father Time places his pronounced period to the year 1963 and relieves himself of mortal responsibility, readying the turnover of the tide and times to the brand new babbled titled "1964," we look back in retrospect to summary of local events which find civil rights first and foremost during these twelve months just passed.

TO THE SAN DIEGO Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People — spearheaded by its president, Hartwell Ragsdale — goes the distinction of triggering the key that set off the demonstration pattern here.

This happened — as a first of its kind in San Diego — when the NAACP members and friends, both white and Negro, picketed Russ Auditorium in the biting cold wind on the evening of April 1st in protest of General Edwin A.

Walker's appearance there. Both the Southeast Ministerial Alliance and the Congress of Racial Equality joined with the NAACP.

TED PATRICK and the Chollas Democratic Club members and supporters went a step further along the demonstration front during the same month, and on Monday, April 22nd, placed a strong picket line around the San Diego Police Department headquarters to protest the firing of several Negro police officers and the handling of Negroes during the police training period. Following this, the protest group took their case before the City Council for airing. Ultimately, this civil rights effort resulted in a healthier climate within both the police department itself and its means of communication with Negroes in the Logan Heights area.

It took the San Diego Chapter of the Congress of Racial Equality and its chairman, Hal Brown, to step out and make the boldest movements in peaceful demonstrations when they led the first Freedom March ever staged in San Diego on July 4th. This served as

incentive for a joining of hands of five powerful Negro groups — the San Diego Branch Urban League, the San Diego Chapter of the NAACP, local CORE members, the local branch of the Western Christian Leadership Conference, and the Southeastern Ministerial Alliance — in the largest demonstration in this area's history when, on August 28th, The "Big Five" — with a marching contingent of thousands put on the "Freedom March" all the way to Civic Center from the Organ Pavilion in Balboa Park following a huge rally at the start of the march.

AS THE YEAR was about to end, on Monday afternoon, the most historical phase of the civil rights movement in San Diego was taking place.

The San Diego Chapter of CORE had staged the first "Chain In" at the San Diego Gas and Electric Company's building on Sixth Avenue. Members who had been picketing the company for more jobs for Negroes and equality of hiring policies within the company, locked themselves together with heavy chains.

In the civil rights arena, San Diego has indeed made its wishes known!

A POLITICAL "FIRST" of note and pride also took place during 1963. The Reverend George Walker Smith — with the cooperation of thousands of San Diego Negroes — was elected the first Negro to hold membership upon this city's Board of Education.

On the fancy fashion front, **VOICE** readers selected San Diego's very best dressed lady. She was chosen by popular coupon vote. She was the epitome of fashion and charm in the person of Mrs. Delcia McPherson. On Saturday afternoon, April 27th, Mrs. McPherson was feted at a luncheon at the Plaza Bowl with Penney's South Bay Department Store as her host. Also honored was second and third place winners — Mrs. Robert A. Ward, Sr., and Mrs. Mary K. McFall.

THE VOICE'S POLLED "Man of the Year" — Clarence J. Rucker, Jr. and former Urban League executive director Percy Steele, Jr., were also

We have the same dedicated race leaders . . . out in front . . . with the same kind of dedicated determination.

Are you going to sit back . . . and allow these men to day in and day out push for equality on your behalf . . . while you remain in a state of racial lethargy? I'm not!

I'm going to get out and help him . . . to help me. 1964 is our Year of Reckoning!

Focus on Bill of Rights

Last week, on the day set aside for the observance of Bill of Rights Day, Governor Edmund G. Brown issued a clearly defined statement which could well serve as a "yardstick" for guidance in everyday actions to preserve freedom and liberty.

From Sacramento stated the Governor:

"The history of man is the history of his struggle for a free life under law. Around the world and here at home that struggle goes on, marked by battles abroad and skirmishes at home.

"On this Bill of Rights Day, all Americans should well note the meaning of man's struggles, what that fight for liberty has achieved in the United States and what still remains to be done.

"For we no longer must fight for liberty in America. That has long been secured by the first 10 amendments of our constitution. It is our task to protect the magnificent heritage of that document and to make sure its guarantees are realized for all persons of every color, race and religious persuasion.

"In false fear, in ignorance and in bigotry, some would erode the protections of free speech, press, religion and other guarantees of the Bill of Rights.

"To those we say on this day: Let us rededicate ourselves to the principles of the Bill of Rights. Let us pledge ourselves anew to the words of the late President John F. Kennedy that "we shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe to assure the survival and the success of liberty."

Intern Teacher Deadline Set For Jan. 1st

THE DEADLINE for submitting applications to join the city schools' new intern teacher training group has been extended to January 1. Dr. Howard Crofts, assistant superintendent for personal services, said today. Applications originally were to have closed December 2, Crofts said.

The intern training program is a "pay as you train" plan which the city schools have conducted cooperatively with San Diego State College since 1954 as one means of recruiting qualified teachers.

APPLICANTS selected for the new group will be enrolled in an evening education class at State College during the spring semester. Next September they will begin teaching as interns in city schools classrooms, under supervision of advisory teachers, and will complete requirements for regular credentials in the 1965 summer session.

Crofts said interns are paid three-fourths of a regular beginning salary during the first semester of teaching, and seventh-eighths during the second semester.

Applications are accepted from persons who hold bachelor's degrees from accredited colleges, issued not later than January, 1963, in fields other than education. Applicants must be bona fide San Diego area residents under 40 years of age.

Eggnog Charlotte Is Holiday Party Spectacular Dessert

A CHARLOTTE is one of the most delectable of the classic French desserts — and, despite its elaborate guise, is simplicity itself to prepare. The dish consists of a ring of ladyfingers filled, in this case, with an eggnog cream and fruit cocktail. Because it is made with canned fruit cocktail and bottled eggnog, it is a snap to make.

Thanks to the presence of reliable unflavored gelatine, each time you make the Charlotte it will emerge from the refrigerator just the right velvety consistency. And, as for

other unflavored gelatine desserts, there is little cooking involved — only the two or three minutes required to dissolve the gelatine in liquid.

BEGIN BY LINING a spring-form mold with the ladyfingers. Combine the creamy filling as directed, turn into the pan, and chill until firm. That's all there is to it — except to garnish the Charlotte with puffs of whipped cream and pieces of fruit cocktail. To unmold, simply release the spring on the pan and remove the outer ring.

The Eggnog Charlotte may be served with coffee, or it may be offered with eggnog or a sweet fruit punch. The holiday hostess may be assured that any occasion featuring an
