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## National News In Brief

Edward W. Brooke, the Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the highest elected Negro state official in the country, turned down pleas of the Massachusetts State Republican Committee to introduce presidential candidate, Senator Barry Goldwater, at a rally held last week in Boston's Fenway Park which drew more than 30,000. Brooke, running independently of the Goldwater-Miller ticket, stated that his principles and those of Senator Goldwater are incompatible. This stand has resulted in losses of certain Republican financial sources that ordinarily would have made sizeable donations to Brooke's campaign. Thus, Brooke, up now for re-election and because of his stand, finds himself greatly in need of campaign funds.

More than 100,000 Negroes were added to the voters' lists in thirty-one cities during the first month of the National Urban League's "March to the Ballot Box" campaign. With full reports not yet filed by all the sixty-eight cities participating in the non-partisan voter education project, it is estimated that double this number registered for the first time since the campaign was launched on August 20. The March is a two-phase program. As soon as the deadline passes on registration in the cooperating cities, the activity moves into planning for intensive, non-partisan "get-out-the-vote" drives for the November 3rd election.

So far, twelve cities have accounted for a gain of over 60,000 new voters. They are Atlanta, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Columbus, Newark, New Orleans, Miami, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Detroit and Cleveland. Pittsburgh was the leading city in numbers of new registrations, adding 14,067 Negroes to the voters' lists. In the twelve cities above, alone, 57,414 volunteers rang door bells and made telephone calls to 714,396 households.

On a national level, Negro leaders are joining in a highly critical review of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's report on the summer riots in large cities throughout the country. These leaders state that the report failed to place necessary emphasis on the present social problems of Negroes, which, they feel, should be a part of this overall report.

California State Assemblyman Charles J. Conrad stated, last Thursday, that President Lyndon B. Johnson "kept under wraps an effective riot control gas which might have helped local law enforcement officials last summer." Conrad ad-

## Wilkins Lauds Johnson, Blasts Goldwater And Urges Fight Against Proposition 14

ARRIVING ALMOST one hour late for a scheduled press conference on Thursday afternoon was a somewhat tired appearing and testy-tempered Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association

for the Advancement of Colored People. Despite the heat of the day and the tardiness of the press session, Wilkins wasted no time in getting off verbal blasts against Senator Goldwater and stating that, for the first time in its history, the

NAACP was backing both a political party and its candidates for office. Thus, his tour into San Diego seemed, to all intents and purposes, to be political.

HOWEVER, he did make a speech against Proposition 14 during the reception which took place immediately following the press conference at the Archie Moore Restaurant.

Wilkins declared, during the press conference, that it would be the same as "turning back the clock for hundreds of years to vote for Proposition 14." He also stated that the NAACP, and its 2810 delegates, had adopted a resolution last June to support the Democratic Party's candidates because "Senator Goldwater's basic philosophy that Civil Rights should be left up to the states was against all the things that the NAACP stood for." He said that the position of the Negro is that he has been pushed around for the past 100 years while fighting to rid himself of separate, but equal, rights.

WILKINS PREDICTED that the vote against Senator Barry Goldwater is going to be an overwhelming majority, with most Negroes voting for President Lyndon B. Johnson. Wilkins stated that, although it is not a fact, he saw it as a trend that the Republican Party will soon become "lily white." He, seemingly, based this statement upon the fact that there were many stalwart Republican Party Negroes missing from the San Francisco national convention in August.

IN REGARD TO the "white backlash," Wilkins said that he believes this movement to be drastically overestimated;

and that a good many white people who have announced that they are going to vote for, or against, any candidate would anyhow. This would be termed a "backlash," therefore.

When interrogated as to his opinion on the reported joining with the Muslims of famous athlete Jim Brown, Wilkins belittled any athlete's announcement on Civil Rights with the statement that they "should remain in their own field and not try to become involved in leading movements of this kind."

"I WOULD NOT try to play baseball or football, so I don't believe that an athlete should try to make himself an authority on Civil Rights."

Sitting beside Wilkins when he made this statement was former light-heavyweight ring

champion, Archie Moore, who has been a constant out-spoken personality on the matter of Civil Rights, both locally and nationally.

POOR ATTENDANCE was evident at the Thursday evening Russ Auditorium Rally where Wilkins delivered his main speech while in San Diego.

Wilkins told the audience that Goldwater should be defeated because he is "running on a racist platform." Although Wilkins stated that he did not know that Goldwater, himself, was a racist, he did know that the people who support him for election are. He then identified some of them as the Ku Klux Klan, the Christian Crusade and the White Citizens Councils.

A SMALL GROUP of Southeast San Diego residents, headed by the Reverend George Walker Smith and including

Harold K. Brown, John W. Johnson and John B. Slaughter, announced the formation of a civic group to study and take action on all proposals and civic matters pertaining to the area.

## LH Men Give Nod To Prop T

During its regular Sunday afternoon meeting, the Logan Heights Business Men's Association agreed, by vote, to support and endorse Proposition T on the November election.

A spokesman for the group stated that "because the organization was formed to economically raise the standards of the Logan Heights' businesses, the association can foresee great gains to be made in the area by the passage of Proposition T."

"We drastically need equal representation on the Planning Commission and this is the only way we can achieve it—by voting 'yes' on Proposition T—we feel," concluded the speaker for the group.

The first action of the group was to take issue with the statements made on television by Senator John W. Holmdahl, chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Race Relations.

THEIR ACTION took the form of a joint statement as follows:

"We, the Civic Affairs Committee of Southeast San Diego, would like to clarify and amplify certain portions of the testimony given to the Senate Fact Finding Sub-committee which met in San Diego on September 28.

"It is our considered opinion that serious problems exist in San Diego because of racial inequities in employment, housing, and education. Discrimination in employment has limited the access of Negroes to many job categories which are available to the majority community. Opportunities for free access to adequate housing based on the economic ability of the prospective buyer or renter have been largely denied to the Negro community. Further, the large number of absentee landlords who for the most part are unconcerned with the general appearance and state of the community has led to the creation of an area of highly deteriorated and dilapidated homes.

"WE ARE CONCERNED with the lack of contact which exists between white and Negro youngsters because of the housing patterns of San Diego. This lack of contact leads to the creation of racially oriented fear, suspicion, and distrust which tends to hinder the natural development of positive relationships so vital to the growth of our city."

Immediately following the formation of the group, Reverend Smith told The Voice that he feels that public opinion can be moved into solidarity among Negroes and that this is important in a community such as Southeast San Diego.

REVEREND SMITH feels that the Negro must speak out as a group, not as any one individual.

## JFK Club To Open Hdqtrs.

Mrs. Sylura Barron, president of the John F. Kennedy Democratic Club, and her husband, William, are demonstrating that Negroes in the Southeast area of San Diego can contribute their share to the big drive toward election of the Democratic ticket in November.

The well-known couple has donated the entire use of their property—the Barron Building, located at 2006 1/2 Ocean View Boulevard—for a well-staffed and efficiently organized campaign headquarters, sponsored by the JFK Democratic Club.

The grand opening of the headquarters will take place this Sunday, October 10th, at 4 p.m.

On hand will be plenty of free food and beverages galore. All candidates for the November election and the public are invited to attend.

No matter what anyone may mutter . . . the Negro press will be around for a long while . . . and will make its presence felt . . . whether it's National Newspaper Week . . . or any other week of the fifty-two of the year.

**A Man For The Masses**

There's a man in San Diego who warmed his way . . . right into the hearts of the everyday "Joe" and "Jane" . . . last Thursday morning and his name has been on everybody's tongue since he showed up before the San Diego City Council . . . and made a speech that everyone's agreeing with — wholeheartedly.

He has the most commonplace, easy-to-remember name you've ever heard.

He's Charles Brown.

He identified himself as an "executive" but he sounded like a plain articulate, quietly thinking and hard-working man-in-the-street, to me.

This man — Charles Brown — told the City Council members that he'd like to offer the adoption of an ordinance that would require a vote of the people of this city on any projects involving federal or state agencies. He specified Urban Renewal as the vital issue.

This man, in other words, came right out and said what most people have been thinking for a long time.

I — for one — would like the opportunity to vote on city participation in federally financed projects. I would then feel that I truly was a full-fledged citizen and a voter . . . and a tax-payer.

As soon as the City Council session ended, we were so excited over Mr. Brown's proposal . . . that we rushed up and secured a copy of his proposed ordinance. It reads as follows:

**PROPOSED ORDINANCE**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN DIEGO:**

**Section 1. Declaration of Intent and Purposes.**

It is hereby declared that planning for present and future development, redevelopment and renewal in San Diego and the implementation thereof through establishing zoning regulations for land use and various projects for redevelopment, urban renewal, rehabilitation and conservation are matters of local concern and shall, to the full extent permitted by the Constitution of the State of California and the San Diego City Charter, be exclusively controlled and administered locally. It is the intent of the Council that any project involving the participation by the State or Federal Government, or agencies thereof, in the planning and/or implementation of plans (which includes regulating land uses, demolition of structures, projects for development, redevelopment, renewal, conservation or rehabilitation) for an area of private property within the City of San Diego, shall first be approved by vote of a majority of the electors of this City, voting in any City wide election. "Private property" shall also include property held by any governmental or public agency used or ultimately to be used for non-governmental purposes.

**Section 2. Voter Approval Required.**


No ordinance, resolution, contract or agreement which contains any provision directly or indirectly contrary to the Declaration of Intent and Purposes, in Section 1 shall be valid for any purpose until an ordinance authorizing same and duly adopted by the City Council has been ratified by vote of a majority of the qualified electors of this City, voting at any City wide election.

**Section 3. Repeal of Prior Inconsistent Acts — Right of Franchise Favored.**

All ordinances or resolutions inconsistent with any provision of this ordinance are hereby repealed. The provisions of this ordinance shall be liberally construed in favor of the right of the people to vote.

You might not agree with what I say at all times, but I have a right to think and speak as I please. I will respect those who disagree with me and I hope they will do the same for me.

Well, how many of them have you heard sound off about the bombings of the churches where Negroes worship in the South?

How many of them have you heard prate about the injustice and inhumanity of the southern whites who have lynched, murdered and offered every resistance to the legal advancements of the Negroes?

How many have condemned the riots against Negroes in the South?

Mr. Goldwater has been loud in his insistence that the present administration has done nothing to stem the tide of riots in the streets; but, he has never once spoken against the SPONSORED violence against Negroes.

It is only when the hapless victims take to the streets with songs, prayers, hand clapping, sticks, stones and cursing that one hears the grieving voices of "God's White Children" cry out in agony against these unarmed sons of perdition.

Law and order!! Yes! Law and Order!!

What would a sensible white man do if his son or daughter were killed or maimed by a mob of lawless men? What would he do if the FBI produced concrete evidence that the perpetrators were known to the law men?

My answer is: "There are millions of my people who have to depend on a sub-standard of existence because their skins aren't white."

They can sing "From the Halls of Montezuma to the Shores of Tripoli" but they have not searched the depths of their souls to sense the spirit of hopelessness of twenty-million Negroes within their reach.

Yea! Truly, the grass is greener and the idealistic vistas of men across the seas are more appealing. They have not read the score and they can't play the tune. They can talk a good game of brotherhood but the cue stick misses the ball.

**KENNEDY AND KEATING**

The struggle between former Attorney General Robert Kennedy and incumbent Senator Kenneth Keating for the New York State Senate is shaping up as second in importance to the contest for the Presidency.

It is inconceivable to this writer that New Yorkers will be so blinded by the Kennedy glamor that they will forget the splendid job which has been done over the years by Senator Keating.

Most fair-minded people will concede that the former Attorney General did an over-all outstanding job while his brother was reigning in the White House. Yet, it cannot be truthfully said that his record is spotless or perfectly consistent in defense of the rights of the Negro people.

Let us not forget the several occasions when the civil rights struggle was at its height in crucial areas and Robert Kennedy seriously undercut the position of the civil rights leadership by calling for the Negro to "go slow."

Let us not forget that, as Chief Officer of the Justice Department, Bob Kennedy was the boss of J. Edgar Hoover, the head of the F.B.I. Mr. Kennedy has been credited with standing up to Mr. Hoover on several issues, but not to our memory, on the issue of the F.B.I.'s miserable failure in the protection of Negro victims of southern brutality and killings.

The almost unbroken F.B.I. record of coming up with blanks in solving civil rights murders and church bombings did not measurably improve under Bob Kennedy.

Let us not forget either that there were several instances when monstrous crimes were committed against the Negro and when appealed to by the Negro leadership, Mr. Kennedy contended, as he did when the three youngsters were murdered in Mississippi, that the Justice Department had no jurisdiction. Some fine legal minds have countered this claim that the Government has no authority to protect the constitutional rights of its citizens and to safe-guard their liberty and their lives.

**Unanswered**

Recently, when we returned from a trip to St. Augustine, Florida, where we had learned directly from the lips of Dr. King and his aides how little protection the Government was giving to them against roving,

tokenism because the sand is running out . . . sooner than you think.

The real great tragedy of the backlash is the fact that the American press is only lulling the American white man into a sense of false security whereby he is digging his own grave. Procrastination, ridicule and fear will not work.

To be able to come to grips with truth and reality is more formidable than the atomic bomb or genocide.

America is going to have to spend as much money for brotherhood and plain human decency at home as it spends in armaments abroad. If billions can be poured into a program to conquer outer space, then, America, white America, is going to have to marshal its intellectual resources, its leadership, its financial resources, its moral resources, its spiritual resources, its legal brains, its constitutional background and its human manpower to eradicate the ignominy of color and race hatred from its good name.

You hear a lot of hokum about what the rest of the world thinks about America but very little is done from the grass roots level to eliminate the blot.

Indignity and humiliation are crimes for which white America must pay.

You can't destroy the spirit of a man by educating him and then letting him grovel in the ghetto for liberation by telling him to pull himself up by his own bootstraps. His vital energy has been destroyed by the system which led him to the brink. But, according to that system, he'll never see the promised land.

John Donne once wrote: "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the Continent, a part of the main; if a clod be washed away by the Sea, Europe (America) is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friend's or of thine own were; any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in Mankind; And therefore never seem to know for whom the bell tolls; It tolls for THEE!"

**EDUCATION AND ARTIFICIALITY:**

Efforts at achieving racially balanced public schools are often as heatedly contested in the North as in the South.

Spokesmen for the anti-integration groups usually claim the "neighborhood school" is the ultimate in educational wisdom, if it is not divinely inspired.

They deplore "artificial" solutions, such as busing, redrawing district lines, pairing under the Princeton Plan, educational parks, or locating new schools just outside the ghetto.

Presumably, it has not occurred to these groups that the existing racial segregation is a vicious artificiality. All-white neighborhoods and schools didn't just happen. It took "genius" and conscious and deliberate planning to gerrymander them into being and genius is now required to undo this mischief.

Negro children have inherited the oldest, worst, and most run-down school plants in our big cities; supplied with the shoddiest and oldest texts; and are being instructed by the least qualified teachers available — generally substitutes, uncertified, or temporary instructors — with some rare and magnificent exceptions.

One result is the widespread notion among white parents that Negro children are slow learners, when, in fact, anthropologists and scientists can find no significant intellectual or mental difference between the races.

The high drop out rates in Negro high schools, therefore, are in large measure a testimony to the failure of the "don't care" attitude of school boards in consciously or unconsciously writing off the potential of Negro children. A comparison of the amount spent for their schooling as compared to white children tends to substantiate the prevalence of this attitude.

If medical science handled the sick the way most school boards handle education, skilled neurosurgeons would be sent out to treat the common cold and the greenest intern would be performing the most delicate surgery in our operating rooms.

It is in the poverty-struck regions of our cities that children, white and black, suffer most tragically from "slum shock," and where our greatest efforts must be made. For them, the unfettered start in the classroom may be a matter of life and death. Either they will receive the superior instruction, which this nation is capable of providing, or it will be the less by their loss.

People must realize that not all Negro children are stupid, nor all white children geniuses. In 1954, when the District of Columbia schools were integrated, the composite test score for Negro and white sixth graders was 2.3 years below the national norm. By 1958, the student population had become 84 per cent Negro — a substantial increase — but sixth graders were achieving at a level equal to, or above the National norm, according to the 1964 President's report on Manpower.

The Urban League has called for special effort to prepare Negro children so that they will be motivated to achieve and to learn. This means that we expect that extra aid may be needed to assist Negro children who go into integrated schools. Some of these youngsters will require remedial help; many will require compassion and horizon-broadening stimulation. They must not be allowed to "sit out" or drop out because of discouragement and demoralization. They must be included in the extracurricular activities of the school and in mind-expanding programs that have proven so effective, such as the Higher Horizons program in New York City, the Bankeer Group program in St. Louis and the "Great Cities" projects sponsored by the Fund for the Advancement of Education.

If a special effort is made to help disadvantaged children learn, there is no question but that this nation will be better off. We cannot create great cities, or a great society, without great schools for all.

ager at Mayfair is one of the young men in San Diego who is definitely "on the way up"—careerwise.

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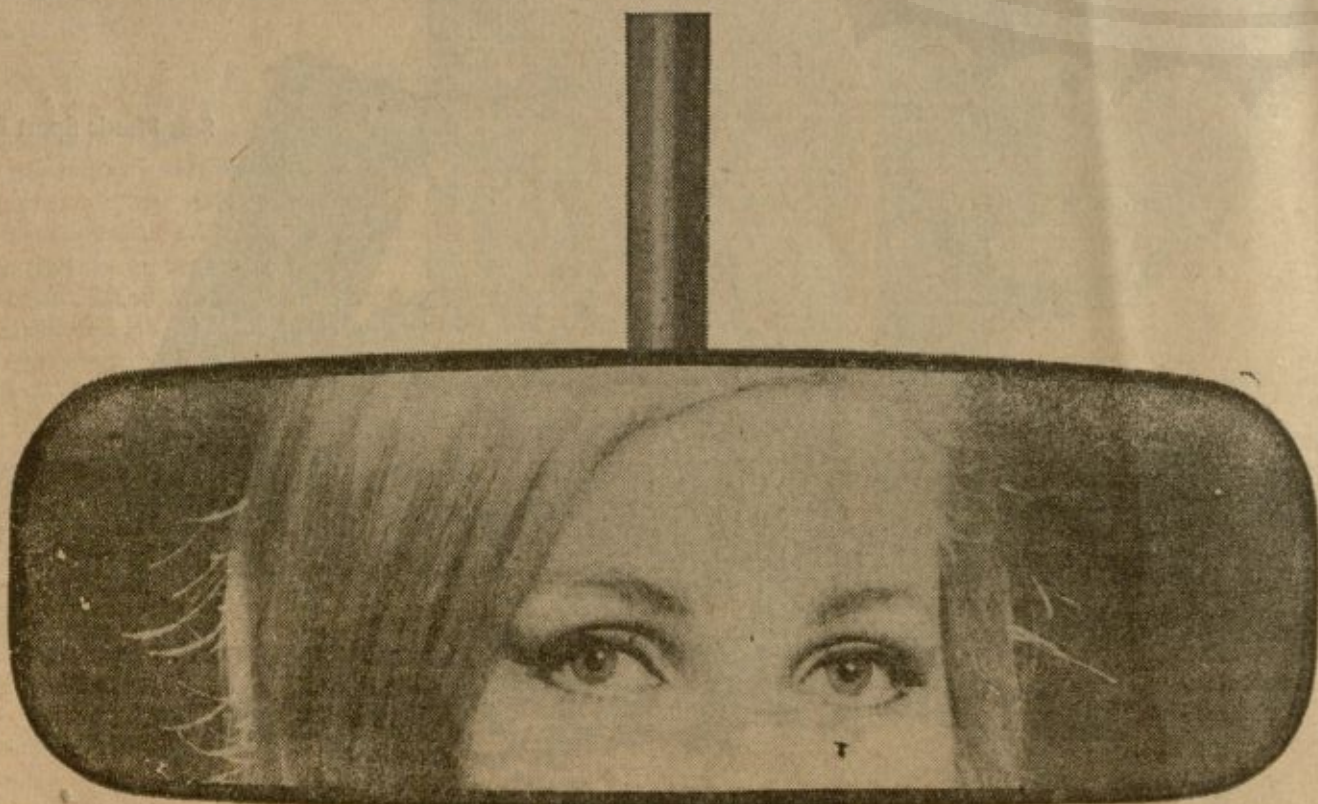
