Africa House to Bring New Concept in Culture To Southeast San Diego

"Africa House will put San Diego on the map and blaze the trail with new concepts of learning and culture," stated Gene Raymond Peters, president and programs' director of the center which will house everything from art to zoology under one roof.

Located in the heart of Southeast San Diego, at 438 South 37th Street, Africa House will open its doors to the public during a formal ceremony at 2 p.m. on this Saturday, December 12th.

The former run-down appearing structure has been completely re-vamped into a 'living art' institute of beauty. The recently acquired two-story building will house art

galleries and a cultural center. It will also have a library and a museum. The theme will portray the history of the Black Man in both America and Africa. Classes and lectures will be made available on subjects ranging from art and heritage to languages and self-improvement.

For younger people, there will be art and culture programs, especially designed for them, as well as social activities.

In the meeting room called "Exodus Hall," national and

international guests will lecture and speak out on important topics. Motion pictures of both educational and entertainment value will be shown. Exodus Hall will also be available for large gatherings of formal and informal nature, such as weddings and fashion shows.

On display throughout the center will be paintings, works of sculpture, crafts and other creative endeavors, by local, national and international men and women. Each room will be

"The Fox" On Top

If you're familiar with hard core precinct politics... as it's played in the big cities... then you're fully familiar with New York City's Tammany Hall — the high echelon of political savvy. Tammany Hall has always... and will forever... rule the political arena in New York.

To be "boss" of Tammany Hall was the identical situation as being "king" of everything that breathed... in New York.

For long years, Tammany Hall's ruler was Carmine DeSapio. Then DeSapio was unseated in 1961 by a reform Democratic leader, Edward N. Costikyn.

Up until now... it seemed as unthinkable for a Negro to become "boss" of Tammany Hall... as it was for one to land into the Mayoral seat in New York. However, as time went on... and New York elected a Negro as Manhattan Borough President (Hulan Jack)... the prospect of a Negro in the driver's seat as ruler of Tammany Hall... wasn't such a far away aspect.

Last week... it happened! A Negro — Harlam Councilman J. Raymond Jones — was elected New York County Democratic Leader... thus, automatically making him head of Tammany Hall.

J. Raymond Jones isn't just an ordinary Negro. He is mighty special — when it comes to politics. Often called "The Fox," Jones had, throughout the years, become one of New York's most astute and powerful politicians.

He didn't come up through the cocktail party crowd, either. He came up through the rank and file Negroes. He knew the man in the street... not the "hostess with the mostess." He knew how to get out and get votes... for any candidate toward whom he had given the nod.

In 1943, Jones was elected to the 13th State Assembly District leadership in Harlem. He rose with the late Mayor William O'Dwyer... and became deputy commissioner in the Department of Housing and Buildings... then went on to head up Tammany's powerful rules committee. He resigned this city job in 1952 and became secretary to a State Supreme Court justice. Jones is presently president of the Carver Holding Corporation in New York — a wealthy realty firm, composed of affluent Negroes and West Indians.

The saga of the success of sixty-five-year-old J. Raymond (The Fox) Jones is one that would please any youngster who has dreams of making it all the way to the top. Jones was born in St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands; and, at the age of sixteen, stowed a way on a ship which landed at Puerto Rico. Two years later, he came to the continental United States and arrived in New York as a seaman. From there, he made it "on his own."

In case you aren't sure of that term "Tammany Hall"... we should explain that it isn't just a building... but rather the most powerful political club organization within the United States.

Tammany Hall calls the shots on who will be the next Democratic candidate in New York City and New York State... for any election. Without the sanction of Tammany Hall, a candidate might just as well forget winning his elective seat... and certainly not an appointive one.

We tell you all this about J. Raymond Jones... to put you to thinking about Negroes... in San Diego.

If Negroes in New York could pull together... and place into the most coveted position in their town... a Negro... then it can be done anywhere in the United States. It was done in New York City... without individual Negroes displaying any selfish moves against Jones.

That's what we've got to learn to do here in San Diego. Forget the term "Negro Leader"... and get out and put Negroes into policy-making positions in white leadership circles.

You can't do this... by reaching up and pulling Negroes down. Neither can it be effected by a handful of self-picked Negroes setting themselves upon a throne as "leaders."

We need to discard so many self-appointed "leaders" and get on with the job of placing Negroes into strategic political spots... where they can help ALL Negroes.

J. Raymond (The Fox) Jones could teach Negroes throughout the country a political lesson!

South Hasn't A Monopoly

One of the truths which has become apparent in recent months is the fact that the South has no monopoly on unrealistic views of the issue of integration. This fact has been made evident, particularly in the area of the question of integration of our schools. This writer has been reading and studying reports of the inflexible attitudes of Southern educators who would rather die than have white and colored children learn together. But there are also Northern educators who share these attitudes, although their verbal approach manifests itself in a camouflaged manner.

We live in Stamford, Connecticut, a town of some 100,000. Most Stamford residents are decent Americans, genuinely concerned about the progress of human relations in our community and throughout the nation. There is a determination in Stamford that the ill will

Did you ever wonder how a fellow feels when he's dead broke?

Maybe you've never been in this predicament but a lot of us have. Maybe you don't know anything about your stomach calling your backbone crazy for trying to carry on when it is empty and you don't know where the next meal is coming from (?)

It can be a real debilitating thing... this being hungry and not having a louzy-louey to buy a can of beans.

Maybe you are wondering why I mention beans? If you have any familiarity with the hobo jungle, you should know that beans provide the backbone of the table fare. Not for their bulging gas alone but because they fill the empty void, beans, and become the staple product of the man who wants something to stick to his ribs.

But, let's get back to the central theme of being broke with not a dime to your name.

If you've ever had any friends who thought they would stick by you through thick and thin, you might wonder what happened to them when you really needed them most.

If you tried to make a small loan from one and he turned you down with a long sob story, you probably thought he was stretching the truth. Or, you might have asked some passing stranger to give you a hand-out and he didn't bother to give you the time of day.

This limb of the law knew you were a tramp because you didn't look like any of the habitués who frequented his beat. You could hear his flat feet hustling behind you.

But, you just didn't have the energy or the strength to pick up your feet in a fast get-away. You were told to "Halt!"... not even in the name of the law because the old beer belly that laid a hand on you was too much out of breath to add "in the name of the law." He tried to lean on you to catch his breath and both of you fell like a ton of bricks. Happily, you fainted from the weight and exhaustion. Even though the crowd laughed, the flat foot accused you of trying to resist arrest. "Resist arrest," he said.

How on earth could a man resist arrest when a two hundred fifty-eight pound hunk of uniformed blubber had flattened you like a pancake because he was trying to get back his wind by leaning on your hundred ten pound frame?

But, you didn't hear a word that was said till you came to your senses in the bull pen of the local jail. Then, your first words were, "When do we eat?" The others looked at you in amazement and laughed like a bunch of edentated (toothless) hyenas.

Fainting again didn't do any good even though they told you that the next meal was six hours away.

You learned that you eat only two meals a day in this public emporium. Then, your intestines start rumbling all over again.

Ask "Mister P"

I take my hat off to James Gilliam, President of the San Diego County Teachers' Association, for taking a firm stand on the real problem that exists in the Negro area by bringing to light the fact that thousands of dollars in scholarship funds have been available to eligible students without many of the students in the predominantly Negro schools knowing about it.

They do not know simply because of lack of information given to them from counselors in the Logan Heights area! Not only do the counselors fail in respect to scholarship funds but also in many other things, such as not advising the potential graduates of the required subjects needed in order to enter State Colleges and Universities upon completion of high school. The majority of graduates find they are not qualified to enter State Colleges and have to enroll in Junior Colleges and take the required subjects they should have taken in high school.

A situation of this type would have happened to one of my nieces had it not been for the interest and concern of her mother and one of her high school teachers. After completing junior high school with a "B" average, my niece was advised by her senior high school counselor not to take an algebra class (that is required in order to enter college) because she didn't have the I.Q. for this class. Her mother, in turn, contacted her former Math and Algebra teacher in Junior high school and he verified the statement that she was an "A" student in his classes and should not be denied taking this subject. My niece was finally admitted to the class and came out with a "B". She is now a senior and is still attaining a "B" average and has been accepted as a freshman this fall at U.C.L.A.

This is one of the very few cases with a happy ending. Check with the predominantly white high schools and the predominantly Negro high schools and see how many of the Negro graduates are prepared to enter State College against the number of white so he can sleep.

The chief of the kangaroo court calls his jesters in for a formal hearing. You are frisked and given a good going over; but, all that could be found was a rank odor and a layer of dirt which belied your impecunious state.

The chief let out a stream of familiar imprecations which chilled the blood of the roaches that scurried across the deck. He roared, "Give that SOB a bath!"

No sooner said than done! They literally scrubbed the hide off till you were as tender as a new, spanked baby.

Somebody gave you a hunk of bread and a cup of water followed by a stiff drink of kickapoo juice. Then, sleep! You slept like the long since dead who wait for judgement day.

Ten days later, you hear voices hovering close to dim lit figures and you come to learn that: the bath gave you pneumonia. And, to think, you grew up with the idea that most folks had one at birth, one at marriage and the third one at death.

Dead broke! No! Broke, but not quite dead! In the army, they called it "gold-bricking." Here, it came by a more familiar name, "jail-bricking"... and you played it to the hilt, for six months.

And, you knew you could make it in the warm June sun!

Crisis in Housing

Dayton, O., may become the next victim of the real estate lobby's unprecedented nation-wide scare campaign to repeal or prevent fair housing laws.

The realty crowd, reported to have sunk \$4 million into their successful referendum campaign to kill all such codes in California, is spreading the gospel of "property rights" across the country — omitting to mention that the right to property is meaningless unless one has the right to buy it as well as sell it.

In Dayton, a fair housing bill introduced in the City Commission is the focal point of the latest attack by the realtors. Although religious and civic-minded groups have lined up solidly behind it, the home brokers are collecting signatures to obtain a referendum on the issue. If they can put it to popular vote, home owners — like those in California — may well be bilked into killing the fair housing bill.

If so, the 57,000 Negro citizens — who make up 22 per cent of Dayton's people — will be sealed into their ghettos like outcasts in the wards of medieval Morocco and Aleppo (i.e., or like modern-day Harlem.) Even worse, the ghetto slum, whose families are enriching the coffers of the realtors, will gradually spread outward under the benign direction of the slumlords, busy limiting supply so they can cash in on the demand.

That taxpayers pay at least twice as much for maintaining slums — the high price of city services ranging from leaky faucets to fighting fires — appears unimportant to the Dayton real estate men who want to keep Negroes confined to them. That the taxpayers also pay for the spreading of blight which results when the realtors cut up those old houses is never mentioned in their literature, either. Or how white home owners are gypped into selling cheap and Negro home-seekers are forced into buying dear.

Locally, the consequence of the ghetto is that the realtors can spread blight faster than the urban renewal forces can clean it up. A second consequence is that by forcing total neighborhood transition, the realtors are destroying the tax base of virtually every major U.S. city by creating a condition that drives white middle-class families into the suburbs.

The worst evil is how Negro families are denied decent housing. An impartial survey by the Advance Mortgage Corp. of Detroit disclosed that up to 15,000 Negro families in Chicago were seeking good housing but couldn't get it — although Urban League figures showed high vacancy rates in all-white city and suburban neighborhoods.

This is one reason why the Wall Street Journal last August 26 carried an article titled "Housing Downturn — No. 1 Drag on the U.S. Boom." Do the realtors — when they refuse to sell to Negro families — ever tell jobless construction workers that many of them would have work if they hadn't dammed up the demand for Negro housing? As the Journal noted, "The home building industry is both a giant employer of labor and a giant consumer of steel, wood, glass, plastics, appliances and many other industrial and consumer products."

Any white family that thinks it's bettering itself financially by refusing to sell to Negroes — or which tries to stop Negro families from moving in next door — is retarding the country's economic growth, its own prosperity, and helping to blight and destroy the city in which it lives.

If Dayton is wise, its people will pass the fair housing bill, break down the ghetto walls, establish a real free enterprise housing market, halt the spread of blight, the erosion of the tax base, and do what is morally and ethically right.

BETWEEN THE LINES

(Associated Negro Press International) Through many years this column had deplored and lamented the South's race prejudice and the evil concomitants thereof, but we have never disparaged the South's fighting fettle.

It has been wisely said that you cannot whip a man who will come back for one more round. The South can always be depended upon to come back for another round and especially if the fight is against the Negro.

As was said of Cyrus of Old: "He was friend to whom he was a friend and an enemy to whom he was an enemy." This applies to Southerners.

If a Southerner is your friend you can have no better friend. If he is your enemy you can not have a more mortal enemy.

Southern Presidents in this country have been scarce commodities but within recent years Southerners have been successful in winning the Vice-Presidency and through the untimely death of the President they have acceded to the Presidency. Truman succeeded the great Franklin Delano Roosevelt who wrought one of the greatest national miracles known to history. He took a bankrupt nation and made it one of the greatest in history.

When death removed him Truman took over, and excusing his uncouth language, he made a good President and dared to carry on in the Roosevelt tradition. Truman was a Southerner but when he

mapped out a course he had the courage to follow through and he faced the color question like a man. Of course he had his shortcomings but he tried hard to deal fairly with the Negro in his struggles for full freedom. Even struggling Negroes had few complaints against Truman as a President even though he was a Southerner. Southerners are not afraid to stand up and fight for the cause they believe in. Truman believed in justice for the Negro. He was a true and fearless champion of Negro advancement.

The untimely taking away of the late President John Fitzgerald Kennedy who had so quickly won the love and admiration of the world by his fearless stand on the question of civil rights for Negroes, was most fortunately succeeded by a Southerner of the calibre of Lyndon Baines Johnson who was not only willing but able to carry on in the great Kennedy tradition.

Ushered by Fate and misfortune into the Presidency of the nation, he took over with a courage and mastery that has won the applause of the civilized world. His landslide victory in the last election was a public vindication few men in history have ever received. He so richly deserved such vindication. A Southerner of Southerners — deep from the heart of Texas — comes to the Presidency, and takes up where the immortal Kennedy left off. Had he been from the East, North or West, Mr. Johnson could not have taken a

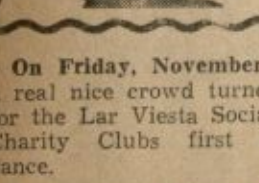



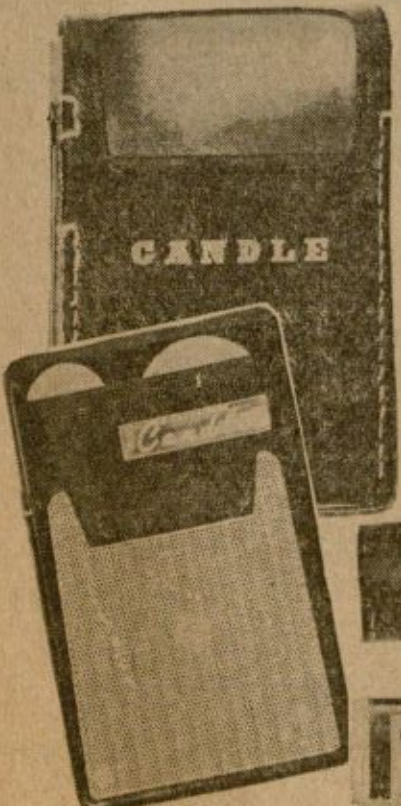
