### Farewell Party Is Given for Musician

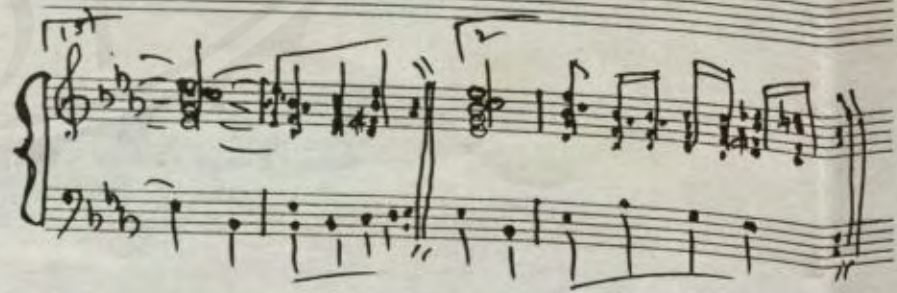

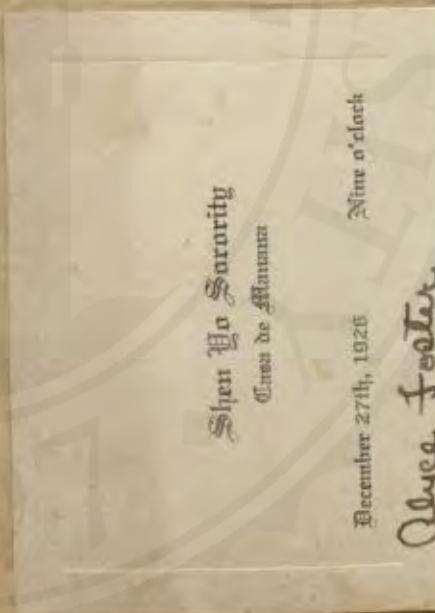

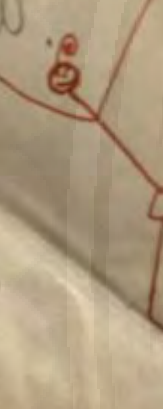

## MISS LUCY MAUDE ORD RETURNS FROM YEAR AND HALF STUDY IN EUROPE AND OPENS STUDIO HERE

The experiences of the American music student in Europe are in themselves a liberal education. Entering into an atmosphere in which the chief interest is a love for and knowledge of the cultural things of life, where music is the ordinary everyday environment, the first impression is that of the super-abundance of everything that makes up the joy of life for the student. Five and six concerts every evening to choose from, for instance each one altogether too valuable to be missed. The world's greatest artists presenting, say, a full evening of Beethoven, or Bach or Mozart, or Schubert; artists who have made a life study of the work of their particular master. Then there are the soirees, where one meets face to face, and shakes the hand of those whose names are to "conjure with" in the musical world. The sights of grand opera, where for a mere song, financially speaking, the privilege of standing room is obtained by enthusiastic bands of students, with the opportunity of slipping into one of the best seats, perhaps after the first intermission. This is a little of the way in which it was told to me by Lucy Maude Ord, when she showed me programs—in German; tickets—in German; play-bills, and announcements; and photographs of those whose names mean great achievement. Lucy Maude Ord, who is one of the most brilliant of San Diego's younger pianists, just returned from Europe one week ago, and she comes "trailing clouds of glory." In other words, the atmosphere of that fine experience in the great schools of music in Vienna, Berlin and Munich, in which she has reveled and worked for the past 18 months, still clings, and the young pianist has the enthusiasm and resolve, that with the impetus of these months of experience will carry her far. Miss Ord, with her mother, Mrs. R. B. Ord, and her sister, Miss Rebecca Ord, left San Diego for Europe in October of 1926, and while Lucy Maude remained in Austria and Germany, principally in Vienna, with a rare summer in an old castle in the Tyrol, Mrs. Ord and Rebecca traveled through the continent, and just before returning home this autumn, all met in England for the homeward journey.

Miss Ord's German experience began in rather a humorous fashion, as she had not yet mastered the language. She entered a cafe with American bravado, nodded to the waiter and wanted breakfast. He didn't seem to hear. She says, "I looked him in the eye and shouted, 'Breakfast!' He shook his head in despair. I picked up my knife and fork and began devouring the air. A gleam came into his eyes. He reappeared with several other waiters. They scrutinized me carefully then disappeared. Then they all returned, each carrying a different breakfast. They passed slowly in front of me so that I could take my choice. There followed three interesting months of study with Prof. August Schmid-Lindner, one of Germany's best-known authorities and exponents of Bach. Schmid-Lindner has edited and collaborated with Max Reber, and was his intimate friend. With him I studied only Bach, hearing programs of Bach, the "Johannes Passion," the concertos, quartets, etc. Then came my work with Joseph Pembaur and his wife, Maria Pembaur. After months of hard work in Munich came the delightful semi-holiday as the Pembaur's guest in Austria, in the summer villa, an old castle high in the Tyrol. Here three pianos tinkled merrily all morning the Pembaur's working on concertos for the winter season, and I for three or four hours a week of supervised work, which I did with them. There in the castle in the Tyrol was given me one of the memorable experiences of my life, as the house was always full of guests—all notable celebrities, some of whom you have seen here in San Diego on the concert stage. Back in Munich in the fall, with the musical season in full swing; a Strauss evening, with Hans Knappertsbusch di-

recting the orchestra at the Old Ernest Kleiber of the Viener Harmoniker in a series of Beethoven concerts; Franz von Vecsey with Kempff, Edwin Fischer and countless others. The great festivals, the Sachs' birthday celebration in his diaval village, the Wagner festival Bayreuth, the Beethoven centennial the Schubert festival; I am still in musical whirl, you see. But now it means work, work and more work while I absorb and digest music my year in Europe. Miss Ord is now at home in San Diego at 3585 Front street, where she has opened a studio for the teaching of piano, her telephone is Hill 4938-R.

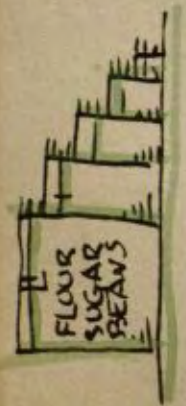

MISS JEAN LICHTY

A graphic and intimate account of the terrible disaster at Managua is told here by Mrs. Robert S. Viall (Josephine Root), wife of Lieutenant Viall, U. S. M. C., who arrived recently on the army transport Somme from Nicaragua. She gives such a stirring story of the stricken city that I will use her own words in relating it.

"In the first second of the tremor, people went on playing bridge or buying vegetables or writing letters," she began. "None of us realized until bookcases jumped at us and the walls and roofs began to fall on us that the shock was anything more than the little ripples through the earth we were feeling constantly.

"Eight of us who had been in the Tuesday Club at Quantico and San Diego were meeting for the weekly game we had established there in Managua. Everything was so secure and everyday, then so insane and topsyturvy a minute later that the crumbling of the walls didn't seem real, not until a piece of tile hit me on the head. Then I was scared and so were the others.

"I'm afraid I'll never forget the time when the girls who were away from their babies realized what had happened. When all of us ran to the door we found that the quake had swung it shut and that plaster and pieces of concrete were piled in front of it, with more falling all the while. We clawed the cement out of the way and finally reached the street—you see we had to get out and reach those babies! I didn't know until I was getting into the car that I was still holding my purse in one hand and my original two-spade bid in the other. I remember thinking that I must take Kitty Conkey's nice new cards back into the house where they wouldn't be lost.

"Connie Hughes, whose two babies were in her house near the aviation field three miles from us, was with me. We somehow or other got around the piles of stone and lumber in the streets and didn't hit any of the people who were running along screaming, and drove to the camp where Connie had her car parked.

"By that time I was looking like one of our better murders, so someone took me to the hospital where Dr. Hatfield dressed my head and stopped the bleeding. I was much more fortunate than most people because I saw Bob right away and knew he was all right. Some of the folks didn't know where their husbands and children were until hours later.

"Ambulances and private cars and coaches were by that time driving into the camp, loaded with the broken and dying people from the streets. Most of the wives who were there at the camp got busy making bandages and dressings. We worked until all the families had been brought into the camp, then I found that I could use my car and go to our own house. I was worried about the three servants.

"The streets were unrecognizable and I don't know how much time I spent climbing over piles of wreckage and hunting for the place. Finally a marine guard told me where it was and since half the front was gone I could look right inside. The first thing I saw was our turkey in the front patio where we never allowed her, scratching up my nasturtiums. I was much annoyed and shooed her back into the kitchen patio and put up the little gate. But I didn't realize how ridiculous it was until she stalked out again through the place where a wall had been.

"Then I began to pick up the contents of desk drawers and straighten things out. The guard came in and said: 'Mrs. Viall, you can't stay here in the house. You'd better just let me go with you to get some clothes and any valuable things you want.' While he was talking to me, another quake came and more of the walls shook down. I hunted under the rubbish and found some clothes for Bob and me, then went back to the barracks where the wives were gathered.

"All of us were pretty quiet. We were glad to sleep outside where nothing could fall on us, because so many shocks, following the bad one, tossed us around every hour or so. There was such a dust cloud over the whole city that we couldn't see anything but the red of the fire. By the next day it seemed as though we had never lived any other way than crowded in the compound, with our nerves strained for the next shake.

"On Friday morning (the quake came Tuesday), I went out to the aviation field to make the flight to the transport at Corinto. There were my three girls who had walked all the way out from town to say goodbye to me and fetch me an umbrella they had found in the house."

A distinct honor has just come to Miss Eleanor Pate, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Pate, 4214 Arden way, who graduates from Syracuse university this month. She was one of the five students in the university to be awarded a graduate assistantship in a leadership course for women students to be inaugurated this fall at the college.

The announcement has just been made by Dr. Eugene Andrus Leonard, dean of women and director of the new course. These assistantships, five more of which will be awarded in July, each are equivalent to a grant of from \$700 to \$800 in terms of home, board and tuition. They were awarded to Miss Pate of San Diego, Mrs. Gertrude A. Hanchett of Syracuse, Miss Ruth E. Abell of Nashville, Tenn., Miss Ella L. Babcock of Auburn and Miss Priscilla A. Carrington of Bristol, Conn.

Since the leadership course, the first of its kind in the United States, was announced a month ago, scores of women from every section of the country have applied for the assistantships. The first five awards were made to women who have had teaching experience, and who, with the exception of one assistant, have had courses of instruction in teaching at Syracuse university. The one exception, Miss Pate, will attend the university summer session for credits in this.

The course is designed to prepare graduate students in education and teachers of experience to do personal work in high schools, normal

schools, colleges and universities, and by combining practice and theory, is the first of its kind to be given by any educational institution.

Instruction in the course will be given by more than a dozen of the university's leading educators, each prominent in his field. The studies will comprise lectures, discussion, field work and original research work by the students, each of whom will be expected to do a piece of original research in the field and must indicate ability to handle statistical and personnel technique.

Miss Pate, who has specialized in music and art, attended San Diego State college in 1927 and 1928. From 1928 to 1930 she studied at Scripps and Pomona college. These honored students after the receiving of their master degrees, will be placed by Dean Leonard as assistant deans of women in colleges throughout the country.

Lucia Champlin never does anything in the usual way—she is one of those persons who manages to be distinctive in everything she does, not consciously but with a just-happened-so way that makes it all the more exciting.

## Dollies From Orient Do Not Say 'Mamma'



Mrs. Meinrad Schur and Her Daughter, Virginia Anne, With Virginia's Hina Matsuri Dolls.

This is Virginia Anne's hobby story. Virginia Anne is the daughter of Lt. and Mrs. Meinrad A. Schur, 4866 Kensington drive, and she is nearly three years old, but already she has a hobby and already she has the earmarks of a hobbyist.

As you might suppose, the hobby is dolls but these dolls don't say mamma and they don't go to sleep and they're not to be played with. But the veteran hobbyist will tell you that the great pleasure of collections is not the usefulness of the treasures, but the possession of them. That's why I say Virginia Anne has the earmarks of a collector—she is willing to get a passive, intellectual delight from her hobby which doesn't sound quite true and which, to tell the truth, isn't quite true since Virginia Anne is anything but a passive little girl.

But she has learned to respect her dolls, she has learned some of the stories that make them important personages to her, and she knows that Hina Matsuri is a sort of Christmas or glorified birthday party.

During the years that Lieutenant Schur's hours of duty have kept them in the Orient Virginia Anne's mother (Virginia Baines Schur) has collected Japanese and Chinese dolls with such discrimination and with such a knowledge of the history of Oriental dolls that William K. Fiske, curator of archaeology at the San Diego museum has asked to display them in the museum. The dolls will be there shortly for the general public to enjoy and though it's a nice idea it is a sort of mean trick on Virginia Anne. But then she's learned a lesson from the little Japanese girls, who pay homage but once a year to their doll collection.

Hina Matsuri (the Feast of Festival of Dolls) is the one day of the year that is dedicated to the girls of Japan. On this day (March 3rd) the girl child of the Japanese household dons her best kimono and obi and carefully, reverently unpacks her dolls and places them, just as they should be, on the Hina stand. At the end of the day the tired, happy little girl puts them all back in their camphor wood chests, where they sleep for another 12 months. The urge to love and talk to her dolls is satisfied for the little Japanese girl in one full, eventful day.

All the dolls that belong on the Hina stand are in Virginia Anne's collection. The Hina stand is built to resemble stair steps, the steps being 3, 5, 7 or 9 according to the number needed for the dolls.

Over the stand is draped (Mrs. Schur carries out the tradition even to the least detail) a purple canopy. The coat of arms of the mother's family is on it in white and the dolls, each one of which is really a tiny exquisitely designed statue of famous Japanese characters, are arranged on the Hina stand according to their rank or position. On the very top shelf is placed the throne room of the Palace at Kyoto. On the black and gold lacquer throne is carefully placed the tiny emperor and empress, dressed in their court robes. On the emperor's head is a lacquer cap with the tall pointed peak (his sign of office). On the empress' head rests the ornate crown with the gold rays radiating out, since the emperor claims direct descent from the Goddess of the Sun and the crown represents the radiant sun.

In front of the royal pair kneel three little ladies in waiting, each dressed in his red and white silk court robes. And on each forehead are two tiny black circles (tatsood), their mark of office.

On the shelf below repose the court officials, the advisors to the Emperor—arrogant and important even in miniature. Below them, the court musicians with their musical instruments. On the other shelves sit less famous characters in history, the beautiful gold lacquered cart of the emperor with the caribou to pull it, the lacquer serving tables and dishes—His Majesty's service. There is even a little case of gatas or Japanese shoes, dress shoes, rain shoes, bath shoes, etc.

Things in miniature take on a special charm and these tiny dolls, colorful as peacocks, and exquisitely designed hold child and adult in speechless admiration. Great patience and great love make each of them perfect little persons, fastidious even to the way the combs in the hair are placed.

Among Virginia Anne's dolls are four Japanese warriors which are displayed in Japan on Tango-no-sekku or Boys fete day. This day (May 5) pays honor to the sons of the household and it differs from girls' festival in its simplicity and masculine spirit.

The festival is sacred to the toy suits of armor, before which saki and sweet flags are offered. The stage for the festival is made lively by model war banners such as were used in ancient battles, and dolls of war heroes.

"Despite all these things related to war," Mrs. Schur says, "it is not the aim to impart war-like tendencies to the children. The festival is to secure for them progressiveness, bravery and boldness when they are grown up."

Big paper carp fly from poles on the roof of every house on this festival and when the early summer breezes come the Kot-Nobori (carp-banners) flap and swell and look as if they were swimming up stream. This ceremony appeared as early as the 8th century but the festival really was observed earlier.

The four little warrior dolls in this collection are Lord Nitta Yoshisada and his golden sword, Yshuvaka Maru, Musashibo Benkei, monk warrior, and Ota Dokan and the Country Lass—they all have legends.

Lord Nitta Yoshisada magically directed the tides and restored Emperor Godaigo to the throne; Yshuvaka Maru, who later became General Minamoto-no-Yoshitsune was "light as a bird and clever as an acrobat." Musashibo Benkei, monk warrior, is idolized by every boy in Japan and General Ota Dokan learned poetry and won a battle. All the stories have a moral.

The Hina Matsuri doll collection is complete, though the boys' doll collection is not, but in Virginia Anne's nursery there are also character dolls from other lands, including a dignified old Chinese mandarin, a Hindu prince and his favorite wife with all her finery, even to her nose ring, a Polish doll, brought to this country by Madame Paderewski and others.

This collection goes to the San Diego Museum to be on display indefinitely. But don't feel too sorry for Virginia Anne. She's really a little American even if she does wear kimonos and an obi since on the floor of her nursery, not just on March 3, but every day, you'll find paper dolls which aren't respected and which tell no moral.

### Christmas in England

Christmas will find Mrs. W. E. Hindle (Ann Zein), formerly of San Diego, with her family in rural England—at Chalfont St. Giles, an estate owned by intimate friends with whom they often pass holidays. Mrs. Hindle writes that the great lawn surrounding the manor is enclosed with a holly hedge festively hemming them in the great house where Christmas smacks of that which merry England always has known. Turkey, however, is the pièce de résistance of the English Christmas dinner nowadays, supplanting the more traditional boar's head and roast peacock. Roasted boar's head, with an apple stuck in its mouth and rosemary twined around the ears, is only a legend now. Roast beef is always on the English board and that's what the king himself gets—and wants—on Christmas day.

The Christmas carols in England are unforgettable, she writes, remembering them as they were when she celebrated the holiday in London a few years ago. The carols sing throughout the countryside as well as on the city streets from midnight until Christmas dawn, and from outside the frosty windows come strains of "Hail," "Joy to the World," and "Adeste Fideles," sung by all nations since 1790.

General gift giving does not take place until the day after Christmas, Boxing day, but the children are not disappointed Christmas morning. Are Recalled in the First Large Marriage  
Ceremony Celebrated in Hundred Years  
At Quaint Religious Structure of Pioneer Padres

Not for a century has the mother Mission for west coast Alta California Christianization, Mission San Diego de Alcala, founded in 1769, been the setting for a large wedding and never has the mission church, with its whitewashed interior, its beamed ceilings 29 feet above the tile floor, its beautiful fachada and the campanario crowned with a large wooden cross, been the scene of a ceremony of appointments similar to that which was performed in the mission Wednesday at half after seven o'clock, uniting Miss Jean Lichty, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy C. Lichty and Clifford Magee May, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Clifford May.

The ceremony is another thread in the history of the first of the California Missions which has been woven in a pattern of beauty, of glory, of remarkable achievement and also of tragedy. It is significant that the marriage of this young couple should have been solemnized in the hallowed old mission since the bridegroom's grandfather, Lt. Henry

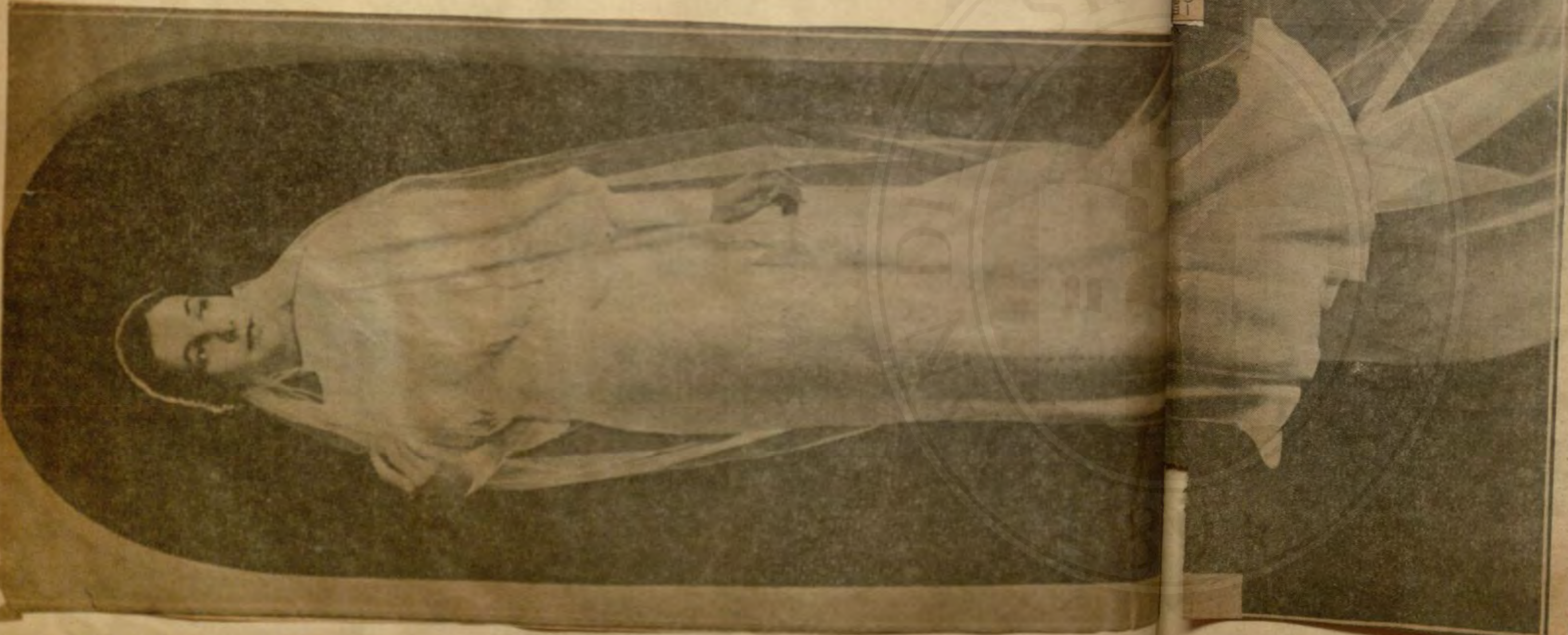

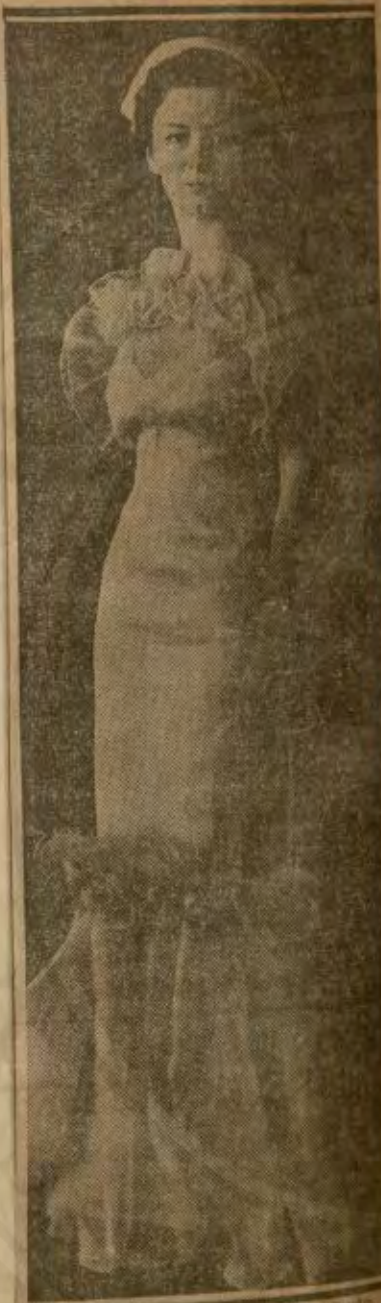

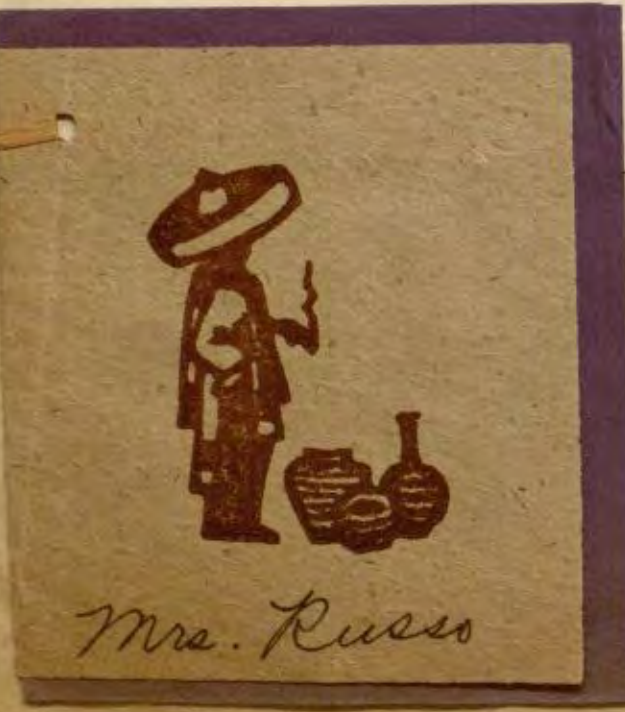
