Dr. Carey Named TB Chairman

Dr. Donald N. Carey, well known San Diego physician and civic leader, was named Southeast community chairman for the 58th Annual Christmas Seal Campaign by Mrs. Jack H. McDonald, chairman of the county-wide effort.

Doctor Carey is a member of the Board of Directors of the Tuberculosis and Health Association of San Diego County, which is sponsoring the campaign.

"Christmas Seal contributions," he said, "are solicited by mail only, and support the local association's tuberculosis case-finding, local research in three fields related to respiratory disease as well as research at state and national levels, and informational and educational programs covering all respiratory diseases."

The Christmas Seal Campaign will open officially on November 16.

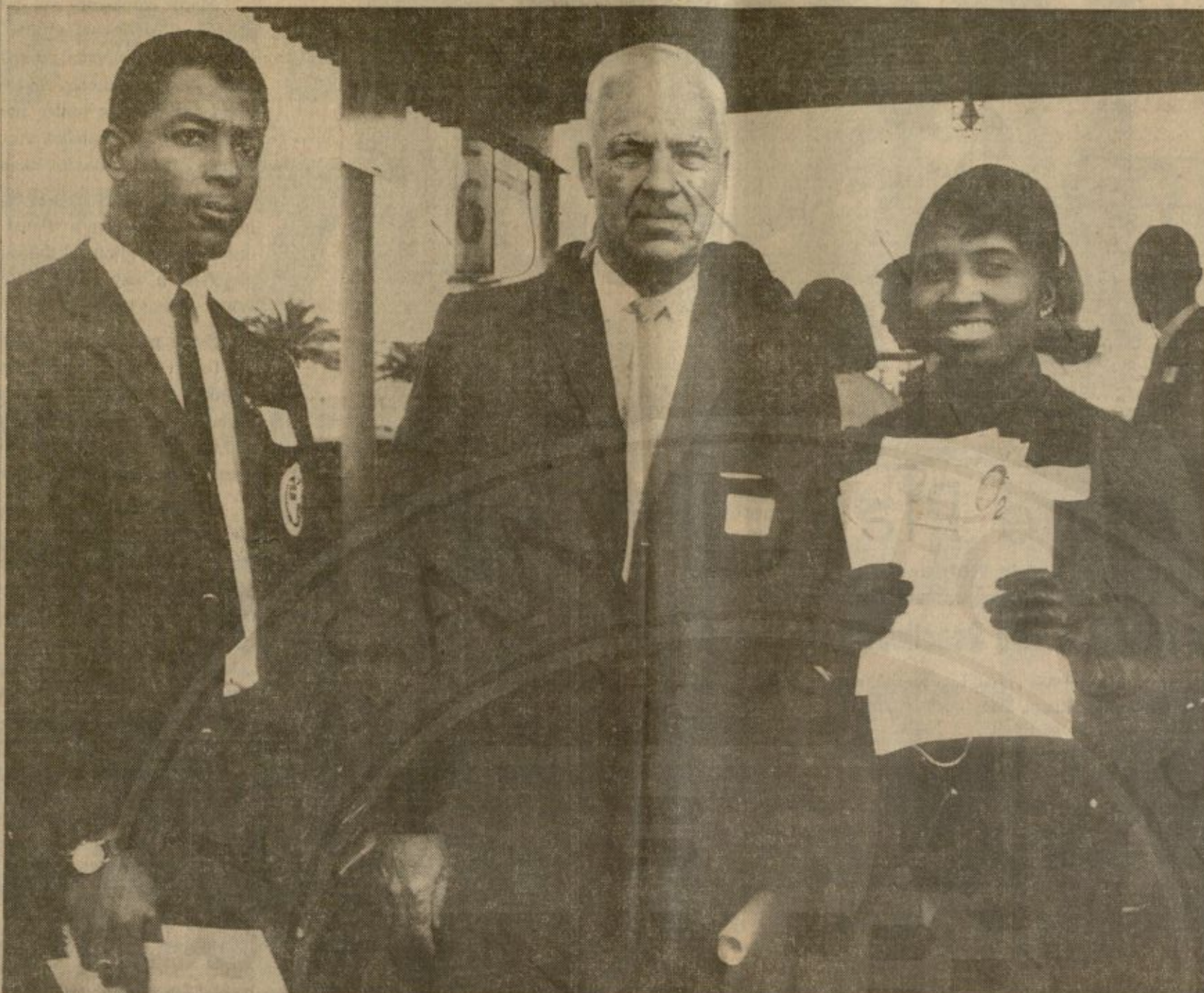
"In California," Doctor Carey said, "tuberculosis continues to be the major cause of death among the communicable diseases."

"A recent report of a Task Force of the surgeon general of the U.S. Public Health Service indicates some 610,000 Americans need attention because of TB — 110,000 are known to have active tuberculosis, 250,000 inactive cases that might become active, and 250,000 have had contact with active cases," Doctor Carey said.

PLANS HINGE ON PASSAGE:

Educators Relate Problems And Need For Proposition 2 Funds

NEWS MEDIA men and women joined distinguished educators and one legislator on a PSA Electra Jet flight on Thursday morning out of Lindbergh Air Field to soar aloft over eight San Diego County college campuses in order to more closely identify the great need for the passage of Proposition 2 on the November ballot.

ALSO ON the flight were student body leaders and

members of the respective college administrative staffs. Assemblyman E. Richard Barnes (R-San Diego) was the only legislator aboard.

THE FLIGHT was sponsored by the San Diego Citizens Committee for Yes on Proposition 2.

THE HIGHER EDUCATION Bond Issue will be Proposition 2 on the ballot. If passed, it will authorize the issuance of \$380 million in bonds earmarked for higher education.

THE UNIVERSITY of California will receive approximately \$117 million; the California State Colleges \$99 million; the Junior Colleges \$50 million. This means, locally, that the University of California at San Diego will be scheduled to receive \$11.6 million; San Diego State College \$12.9 million; and the five junior colleges in San Diego County will receive approximately \$5 million.

AT UCSD, the allotted funds would be used to build an undergraduate science building of the School of Medicine. At SDSC, the funds would go toward the erection of a classroom-library building and a music classroom building.

AS THE PLANE passed over a particular college, the president (or an administrator) of that institution would relate (through the intercom system) the goals and progress of his campus.

WHEN THE PLANE went into a "figure eight" over the 1,200-acre Torrey Pines Mesa campus of the University of California at San Diego, Jack Clark (speaking for Dr. Herbert E. York, chancellor) pointed out the freshly turned earth at the site of Residence Halls and Central Facilities Building where ground-break-

ing ceremonies took place just the Wednesday prior. Clark drew attention to a stand of eucalyptus on the east where Building F will rise as an undergraduate science laboratory and classroom building which is to be constructed from Proposition 2 funds.

EAST OF Highway 101 and south of the main Camp Matthews buildings, which is to have an access bridge erected, was shown as the location of the School of Medicine. The first structure, the Basic Science Building, will be partially funded from Proposition 2.

WHAT IS presently Highway 101 at that point will be abandoned and will become the academic heart of the campus.

A big and festive dinner party for 205 precinct workers who will celebrate their homestretch period for getting Negroes to register and vote in the coming November 3rd election will take place this Friday evening (tomorrow) at Booker's VIP at 8 p.m., with Ted Patrick as host to the dedicated workers.

This "Get Out The Vote" project was begun early in the spring and carried on successfully throughout summer months by workers who went from door to door in the Southeast San Diego area, with Patrick spearheading the effort.

It has been indicated to this newspaper that this segment of precinct canvassers will be backing the Johnson-Humphrey team at the top of the ticket.

The whole project was geared on a non-partisan basis toward increasing Negro awareness of the importance of registering and voting in order to have an important stake in the coming campaign.

Clara Banks Charged in Homicide

Early Saturday morning, Mrs. Clara B. Banks, 43, of 505 South Bancroft Street in Logan Heights, phoned police to report that she had accidentally shot her husband, Leroy A. Banks, 30, while pulling the trigger on a .22 calibre rifle at her front door when she thought a prowler was invading her home.

The shooting occurred at approximately 12:50 a.m. on Saturday. When San Diego Police Department Sgt. W. A. Richardson arrived at the Bancroft Street home, he found Banks dead on the doorstep. Mrs. Banks was booked in San Diego County Jail on alleged homicide charges.

Leroy Banks was a machinist with the Tyce Engineering Corporation in Chula Vista.

Mr. Scruggs Gets Award From City

Jesse Scruggs of 544 South 38th Street was recently rewarded by City Councilman Tom Hom for a useful and cost-reducing suggestion.

Scruggs suggested the use of a portable pump to remove water from the sand settling pits in the City's beach comfort stations before shoveling out the sand. Before, the water would wash much of the sand off each shovel load thus delaying the removal.

Based on the savings of 15 minutes per removal, the City is expected to save approximately \$300 annually in cleaning costs. In recognition of his cost-reducing suggestion, Mr. Scruggs received a certificate of merit and a check for \$30.

Under the City's employee suggestion program, awards representing up to 10 per cent of the first year's savings resulting from suggestions may be given. Last year over 400 suggestions were received with 25 per cent of these being awarded for savings estimated at over \$53,000.

Campaign Coffee Hours Get Out The Vote With Special 'Goodies'

The Man of the Hour graciously answers one last question and glances casually at his wristwatch. The happy truth is that our candidate has another group of voters waiting him at another coffee party not far away.

He quickly swallows a final sip of coffee and departs in a

flurry of thank-yous. Hopefully, he has just left behind a new group of election supporters.

This same scene is taking place in homes all over the country these days. It's the political kaffeeklatsch, a friendly, informal party where candidates meet their constituency.

Both Republicans and Democrats consider political coffee parties so important they have published advice on how to give them most effectively.

Coffee-party chairmen, for instance, are encouraged to schedule several coffees in the same area to use the candidate's time to best advantage.

Proposition 2 funds will permit the construction of a million-volume library of the university type with both graduate and undergraduate facilities. It will be geared for increasingly rapid development in studies leading to masters—and in the not too distant future—the doctoral degrees. These funds will also permit the construction of a music classroom building and the needed expansion in chemistry, art, life sciences, business and engineering.

Proposition 2 was shown to be vital to Grossmont College by Dr. John A. Burdick, dean of Student Affairs. The growth of Grossmont has been phenomenal, jumping within one year nearly 40 percent from 2,750 students to 3,800. Thus, it is obvious that addi-

When you measure coffee and water, follow this simple formula: one part ground coffee to six parts fresh cold water. For forty servings—enough for 20 to 25 persons—allow one pound of coffee and two gallons of water. Time the brewing carefully and keep the coffee coming as long as the party lasts.

MOCHAMALLOW GINGERBREAD

- 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups light molasses
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 5½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons, each, cinnamon, ginger, allspice
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 cups strong coffee beverage
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 cup miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Cream shortening and sugar. Blend in molasses and eggs. Mix and sift flour, baking soda, salt and spices. Add alternately with coffee to molasses mixture. Stir in vanilla. Fold in marshmallows and chocolate pieces. Pour into greased and floured oblong pan 13x9x2 inches. Bake at 325° for about 1 hour. Cool in pan 10 minutes. Remove to cake rack to finish cooling.

It was one of the most eventful offerings of the season, because not only was there an overtime session of racing but fans also participated in the distribution of \$10,000 in cash prizes and watched a \$5000 stake determining the filly and mare championship.

SINCE the present management took over the faltering Caliente operation in 1947 it has expanded to nearly four times its original physical size, and attendance and handle have climbed proportionately while the track acquired international prestige.

It has sponsored a number of now accepted innovations such as the famed Caliente safety helmet, in use by jockeys at every recognized track; the "5-10" form of wagering responsible for many gigantic payoffs; the adoption of procedures and equipment providing increased public protections and, more recently, the unique starting gate roller extensions which have proved their worth in almost eliminating bumping and interference at the break.

FOUR CUSTOMERS were enriched in the amount of \$16,740.20 at Caliente recently when, despite upsets by three price horses, they picked five winning horses to claim major awards in the "5-10" handicapping contest. The pool was \$107,568, and 332 persons got consolations of \$67.20.

That Saturday, when the pool grossed \$93,402, there were 19 tickets with five winners, and each holder was paid \$3060.00, while 417 shareholders picked up consolation awards of \$46.40.

SPECTATORS AT Caliente turned loose a sentimental round of applause that Sunday (Paid Political Advertisement)

when game old River Clipper put on one of his trade mark stretch runs to win the fourth race and register his second victory of 1964. Now 11 years old, River Clipper once was one of the best handicap performers south of the border.

Jockey Tony Dominguez suffered a bruised ankle when bumped in the starting gate prior to a second race recently and had to be excused from his remaining mounts.

WHILE ESTEBAN Medina, winging along towards another title, had his worst weekend in more than a month, James McCullar posted a victory in a recent final race to assume second place in the jockey standings at Caliente.

Medina failed to win a race that Sunday, despite having 15 mounts, but McCullar managed to score twice, bring his total to 23 and replace Alvaro Pineda in the runner-up spot. Medina has a total of 45.

APPRENTICE DANNY Sanchez had the best showing, capturing four contests the same day, and Robert Petty and Oswaldo De Leon each managed triples.

Lawrence Jenner and Lou A. Parker continued their struggle for trainer honors, each saddling a winner, but the former remains on top, 19-15.

OSWALDO DE LEON, 30-year-old Panamanian, had an auspicious riding debut at Caliente recently when he won with his first two mounts, both of them long shots. In the third race he scored on One More Miss, who paid \$37.40 and completed a daily double worth \$617.20. Then, in the 10th, he led the parade on Flying Hostess, who paid \$30.00.

De Leon, second-leading jockey in Mexico City in 1963, has been idle much of this year following a shoulder dislocation. Capable of making 105 pounds, he has been riding since 1956 when he broke in on Panama tracks along with Manuel Ycaza and Braulio
